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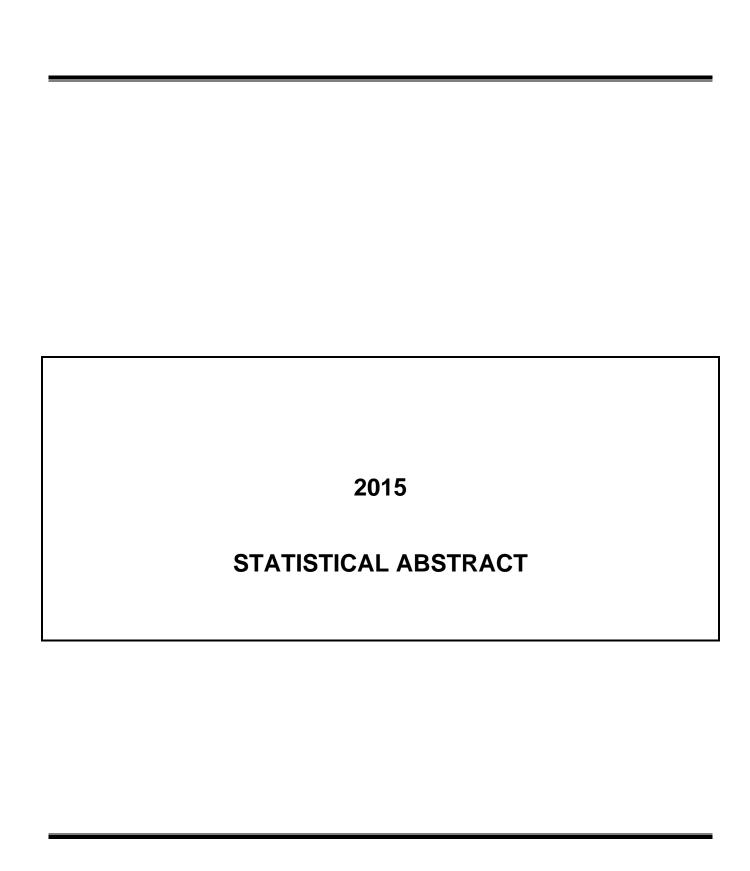

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Statistical Abstract is an annual publication compiled by Uganda Bureau of Statistics, which provides the statistical summary on various socio-economic indicators for Uganda. Some figures in this edition may vary from those in the earlier editions due to the updates. Note that most of the 2014 and 2013/14 data presented in this edition are provisional and could be revised in subsequent publications.

This publication is divided into four major chapters which are preceded by a glossary of definitions and general information on Uganda. A set of Statistical Appendix Tables that are serialized, using a combination of numbers and alphabets, such as Table 1.1A, Table 2.3 B etc, are also provided for the readers' information. The reader is encouraged to refer to such tables while reading the text. It should be noted that the number of districts has been increasing. However, some information in this issue is presented basing on the 80 districts as of July-2007, where this is the case, it is always reflected. Other information is presented basing on the 112 districts as of July 2012.

Chapter one presents environmental statistics covering land, climate, forestry and water supply with the following highlights:

Land

- Uganda has a total area of 241,550.7 square kilometers.
- Open Water bodies cover 36,527.4 square kilometers (15.3 percent of Uganda's total area).
- Wetlands cover 4,500 square kilometers (1.9 percent of Uganda's total area).
- Land area is 200,523.2 square kilometers (83.0 percent of Uganda's total area).
- Agricultural land decreased from 99,703.1 sq. kms in 2005 to 91,151.8 sq. km in 2010.
- Built up land area increased by more than 10-Fold between 2005 and 2010.

Forests

- Forest Cover reduced significantly by 28.5 percent between 2005 and 2010
- Woodlands cover declined by about 29 percent between 1990 and 2005
- Total forest cover declined by 27 percent between 1990 and 2005.
- There was an average decline in Forest Cover of 1.8 percent per year.
- Round wood production increased by 1,896,000 tonnes (4.1 percent) in 2014.

Climate

- In 2014, Kampala, Lira and Soroti recorded higher rainfall above their long term annual averages. Kasese, Masindi, Mbarara and Tororo recorded rainfall below their long term annual averages.
- In 2014, Kasese had the lowest minimum temperature while Kampala had the highest mean minimum temperature.
- Entebbe and Kabale had generally high mean relative humidity at 06:00 hrs throughout 2014 ranging between 83 and 97 percent.

Water Supply

- Total water produced by NWSC increased from 87.3 million cubic meters in FY 2012/13 to 93.8 million cubic meters in FY 2013/14
- Bushenyi/Ishaka and Hoima registered the highest increments in water production of 24.5 percent and 17.4 percent respectively
- Gulu and Kabale registered declines of 8.9 percent and 7.2 percent respectively.

Chapter Two presents Demographic and Socio-Economic Statistics relating to Population, Education, Labour Force, Employment and Earning, Income and Expenditure, Public Health and Crime. Below are highlights of the chapter:

Demographic and Socio Economic statistics

- · According to 2014 NPHC Provisional results;
 - Uganda Population was 34.9 million persons.
 - Annual Population growth rate between 2002 and 2014 censuses was 3.03 percent.
 - 2014 population density was 174 persons per square kilometer.
 - Sex Ratio was 94.5 percent in 2014.
- According to the 2011 UDHS;
 - Total fertility rate was 6.2 children per woman.
 - Infant mortality rate was 54 deaths per 1000 live birth.
 - Under five mortality rate was 90 deaths per 1000 live birth.

Education

- Primary School Enrolment was at 8.7 million in 2014
- About 1.2 million primary school pupils were orphaned.
- A total of about 160,444 children with special needs were enrolled in primary school in 2014, of which 29 percent had hearing Impairment.
- Two thirds of pupils attending primary school had adequate sitting space
- 88 percent of pupils who sat Primary Leaving Exams (PLE) passed.
- Secondary School enrolment stood at 1,391,250
- About (260,000) students were orphaned in 2014.
- A total of 7,930 students had impairements in 2014, of which 44 percent have visual impairment

Labour force, Employment and Earnings

- Uganda's working population increased from 12.9 million in 2009/10 to 13.9 million in 2012/13.
- The proportion of working females decreased from 52 percent in 2009/10 to 51 percent in 2012/13.
- 72 percent of the working population was engaged in the Agriculture sector in 2012/13.
- Only 23.5 percent of the females in the work force have attained at least secondary school
- Majority of jobs advertised (49.5 percent) were in the Public Administration Sub sector in 2014.

Income and expenditure

- There was a five percent increase in monthly household expenditure between 2009/10 and 2012/13.
- The Western region registered the highest growth in consumtion Per Capita of 27 percent
- The proportion of the poor population reduced from 24.5 percent to 19.7 percent corresponding to about 6.7 million people between 2009/10 and 2012/13.
- 46 percent of the household expenditure was on food, beverages and tobacco.
- Nationally, on average, income inequality reduced from 0.426 to 0.395 between 2009/10 and 2012/13.
- 18 percent of the population in Uganda was chronically poor across the survey periods 2011/12 and 2013/14.
- The chronically poor were more likely to be in households residing in rural areas (21 percent).
- 21 percent of the people in the rural households are more likely to be chronically poor
- 26 percent of all people in Northern Uganda are like to be chronically poor

Health

- The staffing levels in public health facilities was 69 percent in 2013/14.
- Malaria remains the highest cause of both morbidity and mortality among the children below 5 years of age followed by cough.

- The number of cancer patients who seek treatment at Cancer treatment centres has increased by 38
 percent in the last five years.
- Tuberclosis was the leading cause of mortality for Children above 5 years.
- Kyegegwa district registered the lowest percentage of fully immunized children under one year.

Crime

- The number of crimes reported to Police annually has remained fairly constant at about 259,000.
- Defilement was the most common serious crime accounting for more than half of all the serious crimes in 2014
- The Uganda Police Force recorded a total of about 19, 000 road traffic crashes in 2014
- A total of 17,848 casualties from road traffic crashes was registered in 2014 and passengers formed the highest percentage with (37 percent)
- The leading cause of road accidents in 2014 was Careless driving (43 percent),
- About 27 percent of road accident crashes occurred between 4:00-8:00pm
- Uganda's Prison Population in 2014 stood at 42,054 people
- In 2014, 262 prisoners occupied space meant for 100 prisoners
- The western region recorded the highest deaths in prison.

Chapter Three presents statistics on Production, which for purposes of this Abstract include Agriculture and Fisheries, Industry, Producer Prices, Energy, Building and Construction, Transport and Communications, Tourism and Migration. Below are the highlights of the Chapter:

Agriculture

- Area planted for Food crops stood at 918,000 Hectares in 2014.
- A total of 4,578,000 tonnes of Bananas were produced in 2014.
- About 3,700,000 tonnes of Cereal crops were produced in 2014.
- In 2014, 461 million tones of Fish was caught in Uganda's water bodies.

Index of Production

- The Index of Production which measures output from manufacturing activities recorded for the year 2014 was 219.0, which was a 9.8 percent increase from the year that ended 2013.
- Food Processing' group index registered the highest increase of 19.9 percent.

Energy

- Energy purchases by Uganda Electricity Transmission Company increased by 5 percent from 3,040 GWh in 2013 to 3,203 GWh in 2014
- Total number of UMEME customers increased by 13.0 percent from 574,465 customers in 2013 to 650,573 customers in 2014
- Total installed capacity of electricity power plants increased by 4.4 percent from 827.5 MW in 2013 to 867.0 MW in 2014
- There was a 15 percent and 8 percent increase in the volume of sales of petrol and diesel respectively in 2014 compared to 2013.
- There was a 3 percent decrease in the volume of sales of kerosene in 2014 compared to 2013
- There was a 13 percent and 8 percent increase in the import volume of petrol and diesel respectively in 2014 compared to 2013.

Building and construction

- About 73 percent of Plans submitted were approved in 2014.
- The Net Domestic Supply of Cement which considers domestic production registered an increase of 17.4 percent between 2013 and 2014.

Minerals

Mineral Production increased by 16 percent from 1,705 Tonnes in 2013 to 1,988 tonnes in 2014.

Transport

- There was an increase of 8.8 percent in the total length of paved roads from 3,489.6km in 2013 to 3,795.0 km in 2014
- There was a 1.0 percent fall in the total number of passengers passing through Entebbe International Airport from 1,464,004 in 2013 to 1,449,824 in 2014.
- The volume of cargo offloaded at Entebbe International Airport decreased by 5.0 percent from 21,724 tonnes in 2013 to 20,644 tonnes in 2014.
- The total number of private vehicles registered decreased by 4.9 percent from 133,945 in 2013 to 127,398 in 2014
- The number of vehicles licensed by the government decreased by 63.3 percent in 2014.

Communication

- There was 12.8 percent increase in telephone subscribers from 18.3 million subscribers in 2013 to 20.6 million subscribers in 2014.
- The national teledensity increased by 8.9 percent from 51.9 lines per 100 people in 2013 to 56.5 lines per 100 people in 2014.
- The volume of talk time decreased by 11.9 percent from 17,358 million minutes in 2013 to 15,291 million minutes in 2014.
- The call rate for off-net calls decreased from 315 Uganda shillings in 2013 to 309 Uganda shillings in 2014 giving a 1.9 percent decrease.
- The internet penetration rose from 20.7 percent in 2013 to 42.5 percent in 2014
- The total number of registered mobile money customers increased by 30.1 percent from 14.2 million in 2013 to 18.5 million in 2014.
- The volume of letters handled by Posta Uganda decreased by 12.4 percent from 2.2 million in 2013 to 1.9 million in 2014

Migration and Tourism

- The country recorded a total of 1.7 million international arrivals and 1.6 million departures in 2014.
- The number of visitors to national parks decreased from about 214,000 in 2013 to about 203,000 in 2014
- Tourists visiting Friends and Relatives in Uganda decreased from about 528,000 in 2013 to about 441,000 in 2014.
- The most popularly visited national park in 2014 was Murchison Falls (33.0 percent), followed by Queen Elizabeth (29.0 percent) and Lake Mburo National Park (13.0 percent).
- 44.0 percent of the visitors to national parks were foreigners who are non-residents.

Chapter Four presents Macro-Economic Statistics including National Accounts, Prices, External Trade, Public Finance, Banking, Currency and Insurance. Below are the highlights of the Chapter:

National Accounts

- In the FY 2014/15, GDP at constant (2009/10) prices was estimated to grow by 5.0 percent. The sectoral performance was as indicated below.
 - Agriculture, forestry and fishing (4.4 percent)
 - Industry (6.4 percent)
 - Services (4.6 percent)
 - Taxes on products (6.2 percent)
- The per capita income at 2009 constant price grew from Ug. Shs 1,481,459 in 2013/14 to Ug. Shs 1,509,807 in 2014/15, a growth of 1.9 percent.

Consumer Price Indices

- Annual average Headline inflation rate in 2014 was 4.3 percent compared to 5.5 percent average inflation rate recorded in 2013.
- Annual average Core inflation rate decreased to 3.1 percent in 2014 from 6.3 percent recorded in 2013.
- Annual average Food Crops inflation rate for 2014 increased to 11.1 percent from 2.6 percent recorded in 2013.
- During 2014, higher prices of electricity tarrifs caused the average EFU inflation rate to increase to 3.1
 percent from 0.6 percent recorded for the year 2013.

PPI-Manufacturing

- The annual PPI-M (Combined) declined by 0.5 percent for the year ending 2014.
- The fall in the producer prices (combined) was due to a fall in prices of Food Products (-1.5 percent), Drinks and Tobacco (-0.9 percent) and Chemical, Paint, Soap and Foam Products (-4.6 percent).
- The PPI-M (Local) registered an annual average decline of 2.2 percent in year 2014 from year 2013.
- The PPI-M (Export) registered an annual average increment of 2.3 percent in year 2014 from financial year 2013.

PPI- Hotels and Restuarants

• The producer prices for Hotels and Restaurants activities fell by 0.5 percent in the year ending December 2014, compared with a rise of 0.7 percent for the year ending December 2013

Construction sector indices

- Average prices of inputs for the construction activities generally fell by 2.8 percent in 2014 compared to 2.2 percent in 2013.
- Inputs for Own-account buildings registered the biggest price fall of 16.6 percent in 2014 compared to 2013.

External Trade

- During 2014 the country experienced the highest trade deficit of US\$ 3,462.8 million in comparison to the previous four years.
- The total value of imports rose by 4.6 percent in 2014 after a significant decrease of 3.7 percent in 2013.
- The overall export earnings declined by 5.4 percent in 2014 compared to the previous year.
- Formal exports decreased by 6.1 percent from US\$ 2,407.7 million in 2013 to US\$ 2,262.0 million in 2014.
- Contribution of formal Traditional Exports (TEs) to the overall formal export earnings decreased from 27.5 percent in 2013 to 25.8 percent in 2014 after rising from 25.1 percent in 2012.
- The Asian continent maintained as the major source of Uganda's imports and the COMESA regional bloc remained as the main destination for Uganda's exports.

Banking and Currency

- Net Foreign Assets increased by 5.0 percent between June 2013 and June 2014.
- Net Domestic Credit registered an increment of 45.3 percent between June 2013 and June 2014.
- Money supply (M3) increased by 17.4 percent between June 2013 and June 2014. Money supply (M2) increased by 14.1 percent during the same period.
- The Central Bank Rate (CBR) remained stable at 15.0 percent in June 2014.
- Commercial banks weighted average deposit rates was 2.43 percent while the lending rate was at 21.4 percent as at June 2014.
- Total Commercial Bank Assets increased by 18.8 percent between June 2013 and June 2014.
- The average exchange rate for Uganda Shilling per US dollar depreciated further by 0.5 percent in June 2014.

• The overall volume of purchases of foreign exchange across commercial banks and forex bureaus declined by 0.5 percent in June 2014.

Insurance

- Insurance policies issued by insurance companies generally increased in 2013 compared to the previous years.
- Life insurance gross premium incomings increased by 41.1 percent from 39,255 million in 2012 to 55,405 million shillings in 2013.
- The life paid and outstanding claims registered an increase of 6.5 percent in 2013 compared to a decline of 30.7 percent in 2012. The value of life paid and outstanding claims increased from 11,744 million in 2012 to 12,470 million shillings in 2013.
- Non-life insurance gross premium incomings registered a decline of 2.2 percent in 2013 and the value of non-life Insurance premium incomings declined from 224,014 million in 2012 to 219,068 million shillings in 2013.
- The Non-life paid and outstanding claims decreased from 49,854 million in 2012 to 45,396 million shillings in 2013.

Aviation fuel This is more purified kerosene fuel used in aviation gas-turbine engines.

Base period The reference period, to which a series of index numbers relate, it is usually

expressed as 100.

BCG (Bacillus Camete Guerin) This is a vaccine against Tuberculosis.

Bio-mass energy This is energy that is obtained from fuel wood, charcoal and crop residues.

Broad money - (M2) A This is equivalent to (M2) plus certificates of deposit.

Broad money - (M3) This is equivalent to (M2) A plus foreign currency deposits.

Broad money – (M2) This consists of the currency in circulation, as well as the demand, time and

savings deposits. The deposits are held by the private sector and exclude

those held by the central government.

Cohabiting A state where a man and woman are not officially married but are living

together in a sexual union.

Crime Is an unlawful act or omission punishable by law

Diesel fuel This is fuel used for internal combustion in diesel engines and as a burner

fuel in heating installations such as furnaces. Another name for this product

is automotive gasoil.

Divorced A condition where legally married couples legally separate for life and each

stays away from the other thereafter. However either of the two (man or

woman) can re-marry.

DMBs It stands for Deposit Money Banks. It refers to commercial banks in our

institutional settings.

DPT This is a vaccine against three diseases. These are Diphtheria, Pertusis

(whooping cough) and Tetanus.

Economic activity Covers all market production and certain types of non-market production,

including production and processing of primary products for own consumption, own-account construction (owner occupied dwellings) and

other production of fixed assets for own use.

Employed Persons Persons in paid employment who work for wage or salary in cash or in kind

or both and have a formal job attachment.

Employment This is restricted to only the working age population who were engaged in

any activity to produce goods or provide services for pay or profit. "For pay or profit" refers to work done as part of a transaction in exchange for remuneration payable in the form of wages or salaries for time worked or work done, or in the form of profits derived from the goods and services

produced through market transactions.

Employment status Refers to the status of an economically active person with respect to his/her

position at his/her place of work and his/her mode of remuneration.

Enterprise This is a single legal entity or a combination of legal entities. It may also be

a sole legal unit carrying out one or more activities at one or more locations.

It may alternatively be several establishments.

Establishment This is an economic unit engaged in one or predominantly one kind of

economic activity under single ownership or control and is situated at a single physical location.

Exports Outward flows comprising goods leaving the economic territory of a country

to the rest of the world.

Foreign Reserves They consist of those external assets available to and controlled by central

banks for direct financing of balance of payments imbalances, for indirectly regulating the magnitude of such imbalances through intervention in exchange markets to affect the currency exchange rate, and/or for other purposes. Included are monetary gold, Special Drawing Rights (SDRs), reserve position in the fund, foreign exchange assets (consisting of

currency, deposits and securities) and other claims.

General Hospitals These provide preventive, outpatient curative, maternity, inpatient health

services, emergency surgery, blood transfusion, laboratory and other general services. They also provide in-service training, consultation and

research in support of community-based health care programmes.

Gross Enrolment Rate The ratio of pupils in primary school (regardless of age) to the country total

population aged 6-12 years.

country total population aged six years.

Gross Output The production value as compiled from total receipts from industrial and non

industrial goods and services in an economy, adjusted for stock changes but excluding Excise Duty and Indirect Taxes. This is Gross Output at factor

cost.

Health Centre II Out-patient clinics treating common diseases and offering antenatal care. It

is supposed to be led by an enrolled nurse, working with a midwife, two nursing assistants and a health assistant. According to the Ugandan government's health policy, every parish is supposed to have a Health

Centre II.

Health Centre III Health centres with facilities which include an operation room and a section

for minor surgery headed by a clinical officer and they are normally at county level. It offers the continuous basic preventive and curative care and provides support supervision of the community and the Health Centre II

facilities under its jurisdiction.

Health Centre IV The Health Centre IV is a mini-hospital that provides the kind of services found at Health Centre III, but it should have separate wards for men,

women, and children and should be able to admit patients. It should have a senior medical officer and another doctor as well as a theatre for carrying out emergency operations. It serves a county or a parliamentary

constituency.

Heavy Fuel Oil This is residual fuel obtained after refinery of petroleum products. It is used

in ships and industrial large-scale heating installations as a fuel in furnaces

or boilers.

Imports Inward flows of goods from the rest of the world into the economic territory

of a country.

Index Number A number that shows relative change in price or volume between the base

period and another period.

Industry This is an economic activity undertaken by a business establishment as

specified in the ISIC.

Inflation This is the persistent increase in the general level of prices of goods and

services in an economy over a period of time

Intermediate Consumption This is the value of goods and services that are used in the process of

production of other goods and services rather than final consumption

Kerosene This is fuel used as an illuminant for lighting and in some cases for cooking.

Labour force This refers to the current supply of labour for the production of goods and

services in exchange for pay or profit.

Labour Force Participation

Rate

This refers to the proportion of the country's population that engages actively in economic activities.

Large Business Business establishment employing 100 or more persons.

Liquid Petroleum Gase (LPG's) are hydrocarbons, which are gaseous

under conditions of normal temperature and pressure but are liquefied by compression or cooling to facilitate storage, handling and transportation.

Loan A loan may be money or securities supplied by one party (the lender) to a

second party (the borrower) in a transaction in return for a promised future payment by the borrower. Such transactions normally include the payment of interest due to the lender as per agreed repayment schedules between

the two parties.

Micro Hydro Power Stations Hydro Power Stations generating electricity in the range of 5 KW – 100 KW

Mini Hydro Power Stations Hydro Power Stations generating electricity in the range of 101 KW – 1 MW

National Referral Hospitals In addition to the services offered at the regional referral hospital, they

provide comprehensive specialist services and are involved in teaching and

health research.

population aged 6 -12 years.

Net Intake Rate The ratio of the pupils aged six in primary one to the country total population

aged 6 years.

Non-traditional exports Refers to commodities other than traditional exports (Coffee, Cotton, Tea,

and Tobacco) that have recently featured in Uganda's export trade.

Occupation Refers to the nature of task and duties performed during the reference

period preceding the interview by persons in paid employment, unpaid

family work or self-employment jobs.

Orphan A child whose biological parent or both parents are dead. Single orphans

Overdraft A type of a short-term loan particularly used to supply short-term working

capital to tide over the production cycle or finance for seasonal

requirements.

Passengers Travellers in a car, bus, train, plane or ship who are not driving or part of the

crew. These also include those embarked and disembarked.

Performance Index Measure the quality of passing at all levels of education. Computation

It is the measure of the depth of poverty, however, with limitations since it is insensitive to how consumption is distributed among the poor mainly below the poverty line. P1 is the per capita cost of eradicating poverty, as a percentage of the poverty line, if money could be

targeted perfectly.

Prison Place where people are kept as a punishment for crimes they have

committed or while awaiting trial.

Prisoner A person kept in prison as a punishment for a crime or while waiting for trial.

Proportional morbidity ratio

This is the proportion attributable to a given cause of illness. It is a proxy for

the prevalence of sickness in a population.

Producer Price The producer price is the amount receivable by the producer from the

purchaser for a unit of a good or service produced as output minus any VAT, or similar deductible tax, invoiced to the purchaser.. It excludes any

transport charges invoiced separately by the producer.

Regional Referral Hospitals In addition to the services offered at the general hospital, these hospitals

offer specialist services such as psychiatry, ear, nose and throat (ENT), radiology, pathology, ophthalmology as well as higher level surgical and

medical services, including teaching and research.

Relative Humidity This is a measure of the amount of water vapor/moisture in the air (at a

specific temperature) compared to the maximum amount of water vapor air could hold at that temperature, and is given as a percentage value. Relative humidity depends on the temperature of the air, as warm air can hold more moisture than cold air. Relative humidity of 100 percent indicates that the air is holding all the water it can at the current temperature and any additional

moisture at that point will result in condensation.

Residents Persons whose usual residence is Uganda including those whose

nationality is not Ugandan.

Retained Reserves This is the increase in value of a currency or the increase in value of fixed

assets consisting mainly of freehold land and buildings.

Revaluation reserves Reserves arising due to the revaluation of fixed assets but cannot be paid

out as dividends because they are not realised profits. They merely restate

the value of an asset.

Separated A situation where married couples separate from each other without

legalizing the separation, and hence can re-unite after some time. However

they are still regarded as married from the legal point of view.

Single A man or woman who has never been married or never been in a

consensual union.

Solid waste Any semisolid or solid matter created by human or animal activities, and

which are disposed because they are hazardous or useless.

Squared Poverty Gap (P2) This is the sum over all individuals of the square of the shortfall of their real

private consumption per adult equivalent and the poverty line divided by the poverty line. The reason to square the shortfall is to give greater weight to those who are living far below the line. The indicator caters for a policy which also makes transfers from someone just below the poverty line to the

poorest person which P1 does not reflect.

Teaching Service Teaching Service comprises of teachers of primary schools, secondary and

technical schools, commercial and technical colleges and institutions.

Trade Balance

The difference in value between the country's visible imports and exports.

Civil Servants

Employees of line ministries, teaching service, police, prison, public universities and local governments.

Traditional Exports

Long-term export cash crops introduced to Uganda long time ago. That is Coffee, Cotton, Tea and Tobacco.

Treasury Bill

Short-term bearer securities with maturities of 91 days, 182 days, 273 days or 364 days issued by Bank of Uganda.

Underemployment

This is defined as all persons of working age who were not in employment, carried out activities to seek employment during a specified recent period and were currently available to take up employment given a job opportunity.

Value Added

The value of outcome when factors of production interact to produce and avail goods and services. Value added is the difference between the value of gross output and the value of intermediate inputs. Value added comprises of the following:

- (a) Compensation of employees
- (b) Consumption of fixed capital (depreciation)
- (c) Licenses
- (d) Rent
- (e) Interest
- (f) Operating surplus (usually) net profit or loss and other small items

Value Added Tax (VAT)

A form of consumption tax. From the perspective of the buyer, it is a tax on the purchase price. From the seller's perspective, it is a tax only on the value added to a product, material or service.

Wage Bill

All cash payments made by employers in return for labour provided by the employees. The payments include salaries and wages, overtime, holiday pay, bonuses, commissions, sick leave and any other allowances paid in cash to the employees.

Work

Comprises of own-use production work, employment work; unpaid trainee work, volunteer work and other forms of work. Work excludes activities that do not involve producing goods or services (e.g. begging and stealing), selfcare (e.g. personal grooming and hygiene) and activities that cannot be performed by another person on one's own behalf (e.g. sleeping, learning and activities for own recreation).

Widowed

A situation where one partner in a marriage is dead. It applies to both monogamous and polygamous marriages. In case of polygamous marriages where the man is dead, the women are referred to as widows. However, where a man loses one of his many wives, he cannot be referred to as a widower.

CHAPTER ONE

ENVIRONMENT STATISTICS

This section presents statistics on land, forests, climate and water supply.

1.1 Land

Uganda has a total area of 241,550.7 square kilometres (sq.kms), of which 41,027.4 sq km are open water and swamps, while 200,523.2 sq kms are land. The altitude above sea level ranges from 620 metres (Albert Nile) to 5,111 metres (Mt. Rwenzori peak). Uganda shares Lake Victoria with Kenya and Tanzania and Lakes Albert and Edward with the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). Within its boundaries are lakes; Wamala, Bunyonyi, Katwe, Nakivale, Mburo, Kyoga, George and Bisina.

Both eastern and western borders are marked by mountains; The Rwenzori Mountains (often called the Mountains of the Moon) form about eighty kilometers of the border between Uganda and Congo. Further south, the northern most of the Mufumbiro volcanoes reach 4,132 meters and mark the border with Rwanda and Congo.

In eastern Uganda, the border with Kenya is also marked by volcanic hills including Mount Elgon, which rises to reach a height of 4,324 meters. North East of the country is Mount Moroto with 3,085 meters. The Imatong Mountains with 3,029 meters above sea level, mark the border with South Sudan.

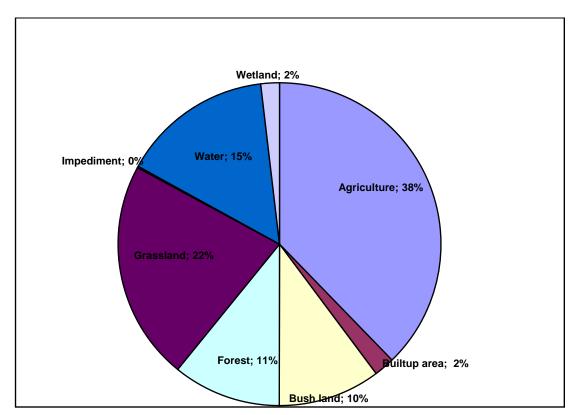


Figure 1.1: Land Cover or Use in Uganda 2010, (Percent)

Land area estimates for 2010 by type of cover as up dated from the Remote Sensing Survey conducted by National Forestry Authority indicated that agricultural land occupies the largest proportion of land cover area (38 percent), followed by grassland (22 percent) and then water (15 percent) as shown in Figure 1.1.

Land areas for Grasslands and Water bodies remained the same between 1990 and 2005. However, the land area for Grasslands increased by 3.9 percent between 2005 and 2010 while that for Water bodies reduced by one percent over the same period. Area under forest has significantly been decreasing since

1990. It decreased by 28.5 percent between 2005 and 2010. Land area for agriculture increased by 12.4 percent between 1990 and 2000, and by 4.7 percent between 2000 and 2005. It however decreased by 8.6 percent between 2005 and 2010.

Notably, built-up area significantly increased by more than 10 folds between 2005 and 2010. Land area for bushlands also significantly increased to 24,705.9 sq km in the same period. The changes are illustrated in Figure 1.2 while the data is presented in Table 1.1.1 and Statistical Appendix Table 1.1 A to C.

Figure 1.2: Land Cover area by type, 1990-2010 (sqkm)

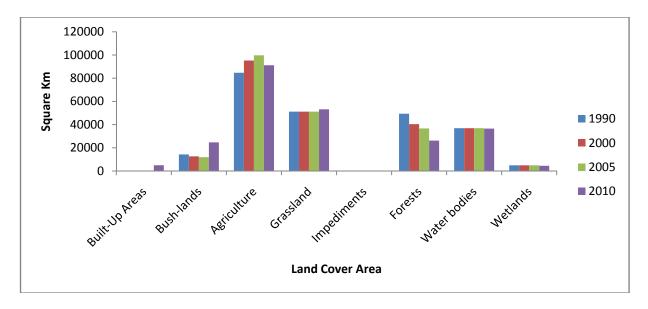

1.2 Forests

1.2.1 Forest Cover

In 2010, Uganda had a total of 2.6 million hectares of forest land compared to 4.9 million hectares in 1990. This is a reduction of 46.9 percent over a period of 20 years. As a proportion, in 1990, forests covered 20.4 percent of the land area of the country. Table 1.2.1 gives the forest cover areas and changes between 1990, 2005 and 2010. In 2005, Uganda had a total of 3.6 million hectares of forest land compared to 4.9 million hectares in 1990. This is a reduction of 36.0 percent over a period of 15 years. Table 1.2.1 below shows that the total deforestation rate per year (between 1990 and 2005) was 1.8 percent per annum, while that between 2005 and 2010 was 5.4 percent per annum.

1.2.2 Local and Central Forest Reserves

The proportion of land under Central Forest Reserve (CFR) was higher than the Local Forest Reserve (LFR) in all the regions as established through the National Bio-mass Study, 2005. The within region comparison showed that the Eastern region had the largest proportion under LFR (2.6 percent) while Western Region had the lowest proportion (0.1 percent).

1.2.3 Consumption of charcoal and firewood

Table 1.2.3 shows the value of household expenditure on firewood and charcoal as estimated from the Uganda National Household Surveys (UNHS). The total nominal value increased to 409.1 billion in 2009/10 from Shs. 32.8 billion in 2005/06. The value of charcoal and firewood consumption went up by more than 10 times during the same period.

1.2.4 Production of Round Wood

The quantity and value of round wood produced in Uganda for the last five years is shown in Table 1.2.4 below. In 2014, Uganda produced 46.6 million tonnes of round wood worth Shs 774 billion, registering an increment of 12.1 percent in value from 2013 (Statistical Appendix Table 1.2 A and 1.2 B).

1.3 Climate

1.3.1 Rainfall and Rain-days

This section presents the Long Term Average and Monthly rainfall pattern during 2014 for eight (8) centres in the country as shown in Statistical Appendix Table 1.3 A. Detailed presentation is made for four selected centres which include Lira, Mbarara, Tororo and Kampala. The section further presents information on the monthly rain-days. It should be noted that data for some centres in the Statistical Appendix Table 1.3A is missing because there were no rains for the months or some instruments were not properly functioning.

Rainfall

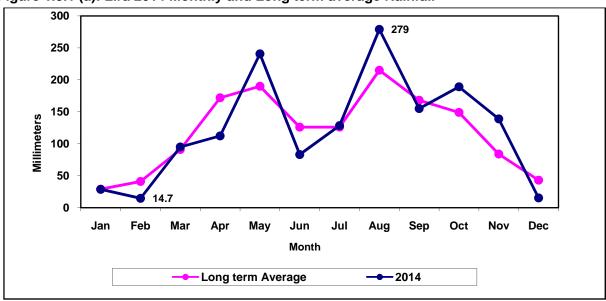


Figure 1.3.1 (a): Lira 2014 Monthly and Long term average Rainfall

Out of the centers selected in 2014, Kampla had the highest rainfall of 1,606.2 millimetres followed by Masindi with 1,529.5 millimetres. Mbarara had the least rainfall of 899.9 millimetres. Lira received a total of 1,480 millimetres of rainfall in the year 2014 (Statistical Appendix Table 1.3A). A monthly rainfall pattern similar to that of the long term average was received in Lira for most of the month in the reference year except February, and October. May (241mm) and August (279 mm) received the highest amount of rainfall while February (14.7mm) and December (15.3 mm) received the least precipitation. Overall, the monthly rainfall for Lira centre in 2014 was higher than the long term average for half of the year. This pattern is illustrated in Figure 1.3.1 (a) below.

Mbarara received a total of 899.9 millimetres of rainfall in 2014 (Statistical Appendix Table 1.3A) with the rainfall pattern similar to that of the long term average during the period January – March and September-December. The highest amount of rainfall (167 mm) in the area was received in the month of November while the lowest amount was in the month of January (9.3 mm). The centre received generally higher rainfall than the long term average during March, August, October, November and December.

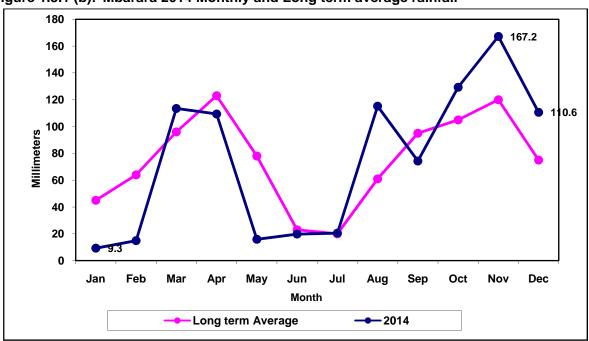


Figure 1.3.1 (b): Mbarara 2014 Monthly and Long term average rainfall

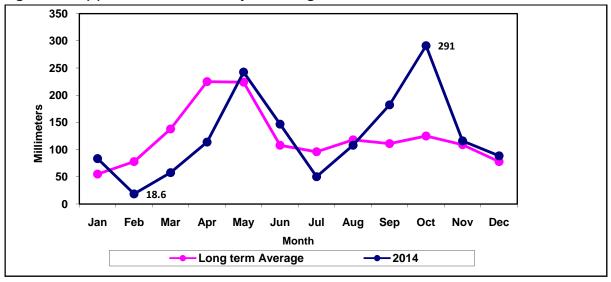


Figure 1.3.1 (c): Tororo 2014 Monthly and Long term Rainfall

Tororo received about 1,499 millimetres of rainfall in 2014, with the rainfall pattern being similar to that of the long term average during February – April, May – August and September – December. The centre recorded seven (7) months with generally higher rainfall than the long term average. The highest amount of rainfall (291 mm) in the area was received in the month of October while the lowest was in February (18.6 mm). See Figure 1.3.1 (c) and Statistical Appendix Table 1.3 A.

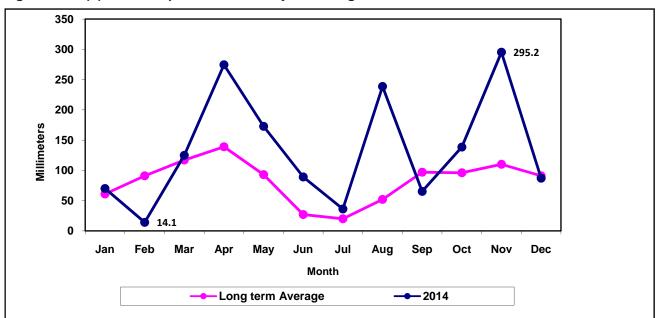


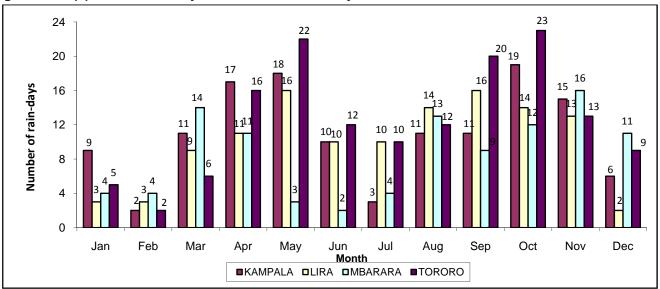
Figure 1.3.1 (d): Kampala 2014 Monthly and Long term Rainfall

The total amount of rainfall received in Kampala during 2014 was 1,606 millimetres. The area received much higher amounts of rainfall than the long-term average for most of the months in the year. The highest amount of rainfall (295 mm) was received in November while the lowest was received in February (14.1 mm). See Figure 1.3.1 (d) and Statistical Appendix Table 1.3 A.

Rain Days

Rain days are important in knowing the distribution of number of days on which it rained within the different months of the year. During 2014, the four centres had total rain-days as follows; Lira (121 rain-days), Mbarara (103 rain-days), Tororo (150 rain-days) and Kampala (132 rain-days). See Statistical Appendix Table 1.3B.

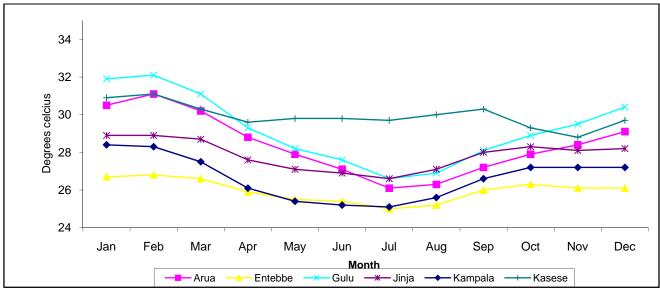
Figure 1.3.1 (e): Monthly distribution of rain-days in 2014

Monthly distribution of rain-days indicate that Tororo had the highest number in the months of May, June, September and October. Kampala had the highest number of rain-days only in January and April as shown in Figure 1.3.1(e).

1.3.2 Temperature

The long term mean maximum temperatures at the six different regional centres namely Arua, Entebbe, Gulu, Kampala, Kasese and Lira were generally highest at the beginning of the year (January to February) but declined gradually between February and July, after-which, they rose between July and December 2014. Entebbe and Kampala continued to experience the lowest mean maximum temperature while Gulu and Kasese had the highest mean maximum temperature in the same year. It should be noted that the long term mean maximum temperatures for Kasese remained high (above 28.5°C) throughout the year as seen in Figure 1.3.2 below and Appendix Table 1.3C.

The long term minimum temperature for selected centres shows that Kasese and Jinja had the lowest mean minimum temperature while Kampala had the highest mean minimum temperature during 2014. The trend for long term mean minimum temperature is generally similar for all centres increasing from January to March and then declining between April to July but later rising from August to November before finally decreasing in December (See Figure 1.1.3 and Statistical Appendix Table 1.3C).

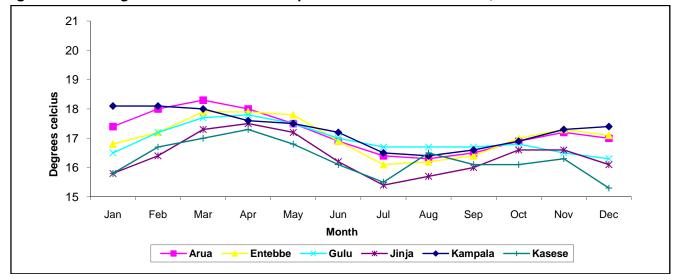


Figure 1.3.3: Long term Mean minimum temperature for selected centres, 2014

1.3.3 Humidity

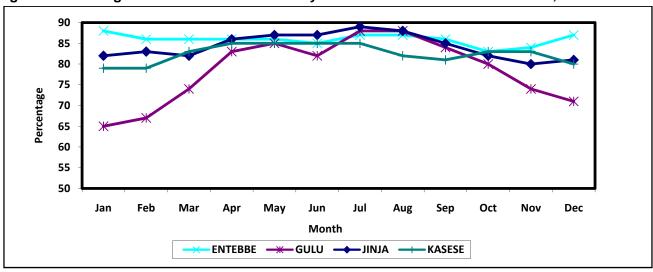


Figure 1.3.4: Long term mean Relative Humidity at 06:00 hours for selected centres, 2014

Monthly mean relative humidity in the Morning (06.00 hours) and Afternoon (12.00 hours) generally continued to be in-line with the long term average for all the selected centres (Statistical Appendix Table 1.3D). Figure 1.3.4 below, shows mean relative humidity at 06:00 hours for the selected centres. Entebbe and Jinja continued to experience a generally high mean relative humidity at 06:00 hours throughout 2014 ranging between 70 and 86 percent. Gulu generally recorded the lowest mean relative humidity of 71 at 6:00 hours in the year.

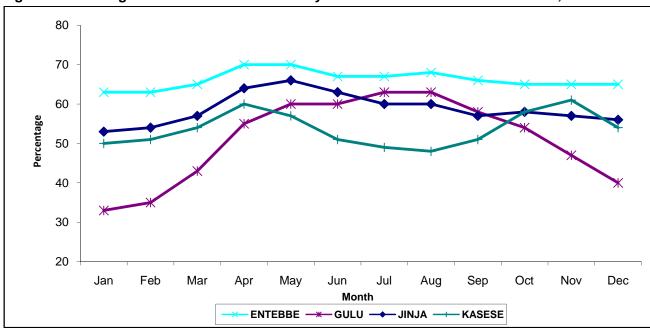


Figure 1.3.5: Long term mean Relative Humidity at 12:00 hours for selected centres, 2014

Figure 1.3.5 below shows the long term mean relative humidity at 12:00 hours for selected centres. Entebbe continued to experience the highest long term mean relative humidity at 12:00 hours throughout 2014 ranging from 63.0 to 70 percent. Gulu with 33 percent in January had the lowest mean relative humidity at 12:00 hours in the year.

1.4 Water Supply

1.4.1 Metered water

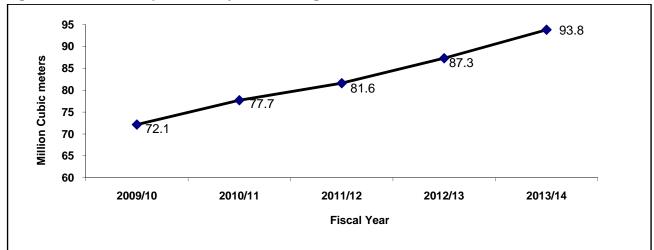
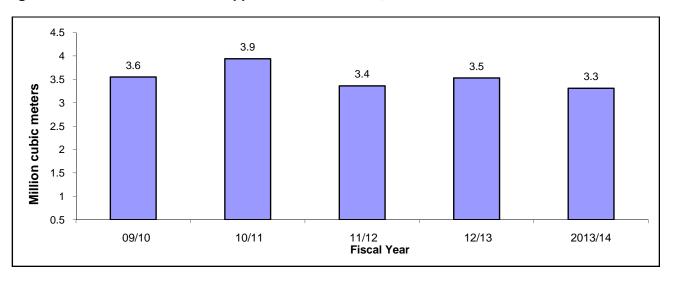


Figure 1.4.1: Water produced by NWSC in Uganda, 2009/10 - 2013/14

During the 2013/14, water production was 93.8 million cubic metres compared to 87.3 million cubic metres produced in the 2012/13 hence an increment of about 7.5 percent. Bushenyi and Hoima registered the highest increments in water production of 24.5 percent and 17.4 percent respectively. On the other-hand Gulu and Kabale registered notable declines of 8.9 and 7.2 percent respectively (Statistical Appendix Table 1.4A). Figure 1.4.1 below shows the national trends of metred water production by NWSC over the past five years.

Out of the 93.8 million cubic metres produced in 2013/14, 98.1 percent (92 million m3) was supplied and from the 92.0 million m3 supplied, 65.1 percent (61.1 million m3) was sold implying a billing efficiency of 66.3 percent (Statistical Appendix Table 1.4C).

1.4.2 Unmetered water

The Directorate of Water Development (DWD) also supplies unmetered water especially in the rural areas and small towns through the provision of boreholes. Over the years, there has been change in the amount of water supplied by DWD. There was a reduction in water supply from 3.5 million cubic metres in 2012/13 to 3.3 million cubic metres in 2013/2014 (see Figure 1.4.2). The highest increment in water supply in 2014 was in the towns of Yumbe (12,279 cubi meters) and Sipi (4,446 cubic meters) as seen in the Statistical Appendix 1.4F.

CHAPTER TWO

POPULATION AND SOCIAL STATISTICS

This section presents statistics on Population, Education, Labour market, Household Expenditure and Poverty, Public Health and Crime.

2.1 Population Statistics

2.1.1 Population Trends

Uganda's population has continued to grow rapidly over time. Figure 2.1.1 shows that the population increased from 9.5 million in 1969 to 34.9 million in 2014. Between 2002 and 2014 the population increased from 24 million to about 35 million representing an average annual growth rate of 3.0 percent.

Table 2.1.1 further shows that, the population grew at a lower level in the early twentieth century where the population increased from 2.5 to 2.9 million between 1911 and 1921. This is an increase of 400,000 persons in ten years reflecting an average annual population growth rate of less than two percent. The highest average annual growth rate of 3.9 percent is observed between 1959 to 1969 (See Table 2.1.1).

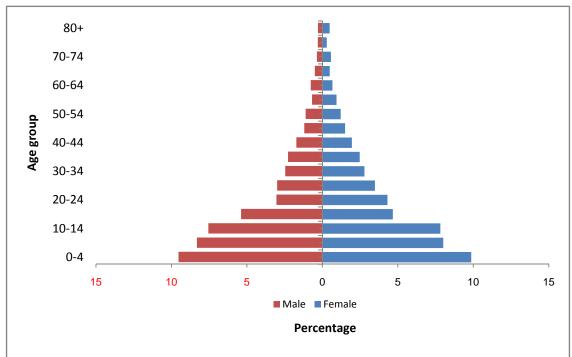

2.1.2 Population Distribution by Age and Sex

Uganda's population pyramid (Figure 2.1.2) is broad based, with a young age structure. More than half (56.1 percent) of population was aged less than 18 years as shown in Table 2.1.2. Detailed estimated population by age group is shown in Statistical Appendix Table 2.1A

2.1.2.1 Population of Special Interest Groups

The population of Uganda is increasingly becoming younger. Table 2.1.2 shows that, the proportion of children (under 18 years) increased from 51 percent in 1969 to 56 percent in 2002. The proportion of the older persons (aged 60 years and above) on the other hand decreased from six percent in 1969 to about five percent in 2002.

2.1.3 Population in Urban Areas

The definition of urban areas in Uganda has been changing over time. The 2002 and 2014 Censuses defined urban areas to constitute only the gazetted urban areas while the earlier censuses defined the gazetted urban areas and ungazetted trading centres with more than 1,000 people as part of the urban population.

Figure 2.1.3 shows that the urban population in Uganda increased from less than one million persons in 1980 to about 3 million in 2002, representing a nearly four fold increase. Between 2002 and 2014, the urban population further increased to 6.4 million. This increase is attributed to four factors, namely;

- the gazzeting of new urban areas.
- natural growth, that is, excess of fertility over mortality,
- redefinition of the boundary of selected urban areas,
- rural urban Migration.

Between 2002 and 2014, the growth in urban population (6.4 million) was mainly due to reclassification of urban areas. The urban population is estimated to be 6.8 million by mid 2016 (See Statistical Appendix Table 2.1 B)

2.1.4 Fertility

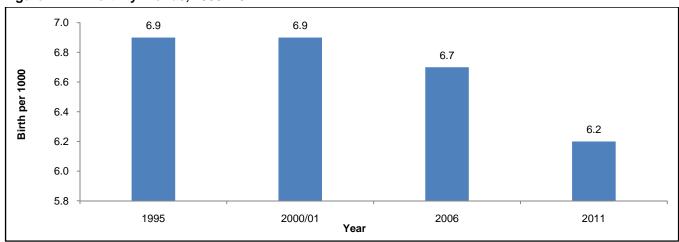


Figure 2.1.4: Fertility Trends, 1995-2011

The fertility levels in Uganda remained high up to year 2000, with the Total Fertility Rate (TFR) of about 7 children per woman. Figure 2.1.4 below shows that the fertility levels have since declined. The 2011 Uganda Demographic and Health Survey (UDHS) revealed that the TFR has reduced to 6.2 children per woman in 2011. The fertility levels are higher in the rural areas compared to the urban areas (6.8 and 3.8 children each respectively).

2.1.5 Mortality

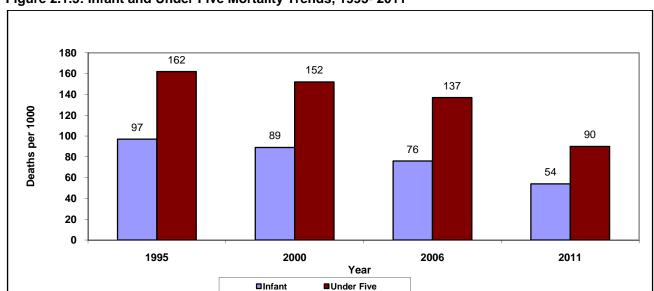


Figure 2.1.5: Infant and Under Five Mortality Trends, 1995- 2011

There has been a general improvement in mortality levels over time. Figure 2.1.5 shows the trend of Infant Mortality Rate (IMR) and Under Five Mortality over the period 1995 to 2011. The Infant Mortality Rate declined from 97 to 54 deaths per 1,000 live births between 1995 and 2011 while the under five mortality declined from 162 to 90 deaths per 1,000 live births over the same period.

2.1.6 Life Expectancy at Birth

Life expectancy at Birth is an estimate of the average number of years a person is expected to live if a particular pattern of mortality is maintained. Table 2.1.3 shows that the overall life expectancy at birth from 2002 Census was 50 years. Males registered a lower life expectancy of 49 years compared to their female counterparts at 52 years. Overall, there was a gain of 2.3 years in life expectancy between 1991 and 2002.

2.2 Education

Quality education is required to accelerate the country's Soci-economic development through making the populace functionally literate and productive. This section presents information on selected education indicators such as enrolment, number of schools, efficiency ratios and access indicators. The data which covers both primary and secondary education in addition to tertiary education is collected through the annual education census by MoE. Data series for 2011 onwards exclude estimates for non-responses while series for 2010 include estimates for non-responses. This was due to change in the computation methodology from 2011.

2.2.1 Primary School Education

Primary School Enrolment was at 8.7 million in 2014 showing an upward trend from the time when the Universal Primary Education (UPE) programme was introduced in 1997.

The Gross Enrolment Ratio (GER) measures the participation of pupils in primary school regardless of age. Table 2.2.1 reveals that the (GER) was 113 in 2013 and the Net Enrolment Rate was 96 (details in Statistical Appendix Table 2.2 D and 2.2 E showing district specific ratios). The GER being over 100 percent is because either children above the official primary school going age were enrolled in primary school or children from neighbouring countries were attending primary school in the affected country by the time of the Annual School Census. Uganda's education system is characterised by four levels; Primary, Seconday, Vocational and Tertiary Education.

GPI shows the ratio of female-to-male attendance. A GPI of 1 indicates parity, or equality, between the school attendance ratios for males and females. A GPI of less than 1 indicates a gender disparity in favour of males. Primary school enrolment by class has seen a gradual increase since 2011 from about 8.1 million in 2011 to about 8.8 million pupils in 2014 as shown by Table 2.2.2.

2.2.1.1 Orphans in Primary School

The Ministry of Gender Labour and Social development defines an orphan as a child below 18 years of age who has lost either both or one parent. Table 2.2.3 reveals that in 2014, about 1.2 million primary school pupils were orphaned. This number reduced by 0.8 percent between 2013 and 2014. Similarly the proportion of orphaned pupils to the total primary school enrolment declined from 14.6 percent in 2013 to to 14.0 percent in 2014.

2.2.1.2 Primary school pupils with impairments

Impairment is any loss or abnormality of psychological, physiological or anatomical structure or function while a Disability is any restriction or lack of ability to perform an activity in the manner or within the range considered normal for a human being.

Table 2.2.4 shows that a total of 162,517 children with special needs were enrolled in primary school in 2014. The majority of the pupils with special needs were found to be having hearing impairement with 29 percent. Fewer pupils were found to be having autism taking on only three percent. The table further indicates that more than half (53 %) of the pupils with disabilities were males and the dominance of males was true across all classes.

2.2.1.3 Primary School Education Facilities

Provision of adequate infrastracture for the children enrolled in primary school is key and remains a challenge to the education sector. Table 2.2.5 shows that two thirds of pupils attending primary school had adequate sitting space. Table 2.2.5 further shows that a lower proportion of pupils in lower classes had adequate space compared to those in upper classes.

2.2.1.4 Primary Leaving Examinations (PLE) Performance

It is a requirement that pupils pass the Primary Leaving Examination (PLE) in order to transit from primary to secondary level education. A PLE certificate which is a requirement for entry into secondary schools is awarded to pupils passing in divisions I-IV. Table 2.2.6 indicates that out of the 581,620 pupils who sat for PLE in 2014, a pass rate of 88 percent was registered in various grades with the majority (42 percent) of the successful candidates passing in division II.

2.2.2 Secondary School Education

The introduction of the Universal Secondary Education in 2010 has registered a number of achievements in level of enrolment. Table 2.2.7. shows an increase in the secondary school enrolment of about 2.0 percent between 2013 and 2014. The table further indicates that the student teacher ratio reduced by three percentage points over the same period. Details of these indicators at District level are given in Statistical Appendix Tables 2.2 J and 2.2.K.

2.2.2.2 Orphans in Secondary School

Table 2.2.9 presents orphan hood status in secondary school and findings indicate that in 2014, 260,351 students were orphaned. Furthermore, the proportion of students who had lost one or both parents to the total secondary school enrolment declined from 19.3 percent in 2013 to 18.7 percent in 2014.

2.2.3 Institutions of Higher Education

The Government policy that encourages private participation in the education sector has greatly opened up the sector and this has led to an increase in the number of universities/tertiary and in addition more courses have been introduced leading to more students accessing higher education. Table 2.2.9 indicates that 62 percent of the tertiary enrolment in 2012 was from universities. It further shows gender disparity in that more than half (56 percent) of the students enrolled in higher institutions were male .See details in Statistical Appendix Table 2.2.M

2.2.4 Literacy

Literacy is defined as the ability to read with understanding and write a meaningful sentence in any language. Information on literacy is collected through household surveys by asking whether members can read with understanding and write a meaningful sentence in any language. Table 2.2.12 shows that overall literacy rate for persons 10 years and above was at 71 percent in 2012/13 among persons aged 10 years and above. The table further shows that men were more literate compared to their female counter parts with literacy rates of 77 and 65 percent respectively.

2.3 Labour Market Statistics

Labour market statistics relate to both people and businesses. This section presents statistics on Employment, Unemployment, Skills, Job vacancies, Earnings, Productivity and general demand for labour.

2.3.1 Work and Employment concepts

The 19thInternational Conference of Labour Statisticians (ICLS) October 2013, differentiates between employment and work. The recent definitions are applied to the UNHS 2012/13 data. Therefore, the information is not directly comparable with that collected from previous household and labour surveys.

Under the current definition, work comprises any activity performed by persons of any sex and age to produce goods or to provide services for use by others or for own use. The concept of work is aligned with the General production boundary as defined in the System of National Accounts 2008 (2008 SNA) and its concept of economic unit that distinguishes between (i) market units, (ii) non-market units and (iii) households that produce goods or services for own final use.

2.3.2 Key Labour Market Indicators of Employed Population

According to Statistical Appendix Table 2.3.A, the total working population in Uganda was estimated at 13.9 million of which 56.8 percent (7.9 million) are employed. Labour Force Participation Rate (LFPR) was 52.8 percent while the Employment to Population Ratio (EPR) was 47.8 percent. The overall Unemployment Rate (UR) was 9.4 percent in 2012/13 with the females experiencing higher unemployment rates (11 percent) than males (8 percent).

The time related underemployment rate was about 8.9 percent, skill-related under employment was 5.6 percent and the wage related inadequate employment was 12.9 percent.

The information in Statistical Appendix Table 2.3.A reveals that 47.4 percent of the population in employment were paid employees while 52.6 percent were self employed. The table further indicates that the agriculture, forestry and fishing sector had the highest percentage of employees (34 percent). This was followed by those in sale, maintenance, repair of vehicles and personal goods (trade) who constituted 23 percent. The education level of the persons in employment was low with less than one third of the employed persons (30 percent) having attained either secondary education or specialized training. (Statistical Appendix Table 2.3.B)

2.3.2.1 Labour Underutilisation components

Due to the agrarian nature of Uganda's economy, the low rates of open unemployment are expected. The population outside the formal labour force engages in some kind of work— even for a few hours and at low wages especially in the informal sector. Therefore, the unemployment rate derived using the international definition does not provide a real picture of the supply-demand balance of the labour market and the degree of inefficiency that prevails in the labour market. To get a clearer picture of the labour market, the unemployment rate is analyzed alongside other forms of mal-employment such as, insufficiency of the volume of work (time related under employment, low remuneration (low earnings) and incompatibility of education and occupation (skills mismatch).

Labour underutilization rate was 19.9 percent (3,292,000 persons) of the working age population 2012/13. The proportion is higher among males (24.4 percent) compared to females (15.9 percent) as indicated in Table 2.3.1. The labour underutilization was composed of mainly the income/wage related inadequate employment rate (31 percent). It should be noted that outright unemployment contributes 25 percent of the total labour underutilization.

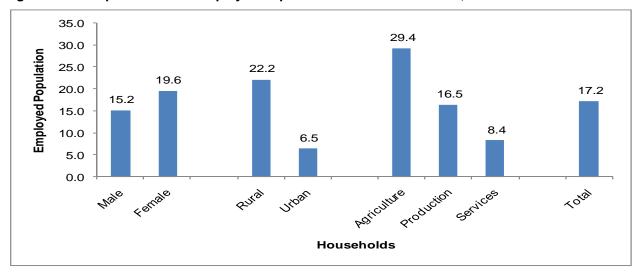

2.3.2.2 Persons in Employment living in Poor Households

The working poor are working people whose expenditure falls below the given poverty line. According to the 2012/13 Uganda National Household Survey, 17.2 percent (about 1,354,000 persons) of the persons in employment were living in poor households (See Figure 2.3.1 below). The situation was more than thrice for rural residents compared to their urban counterparts. Employed persons in primary sector (agriculture, forestry and fishing) were poorer compared to those in production and services sectors.

2.3.2.3 Women in Employment

Figure 2.3.2 indicates that overall, females constituted 45.4 percent of the persons in employment. The proportion of females in paid employment was 37.3 percent, while the females were the majority for persons in self-employment (52.6 percent). Men out-numbered women in all the three sectors of production with the service sector employing the highest proportion of women (47.8 pecent).

2.3.2.4 Median Monthly wages for paid employees, 14-64 years

The UNHS 2012/13 collected information on income accruing to individuals in paid employment. The information was collected on different modes of payment including set piece, on the basis of sales, a combination of set piece and basis of sales, in kind or any other means. The earnings of individuals were collected from all jobs in which persons were engaged.

Table 2.3.2 indicates that overall, the median monthly earnings increased from shs 80,000 in 2009/10 to shs. 110,000 in nominal terms in 2012/13. However in real terms (CPI 2012/13=200.2, CPI 2009/10=144.0 for 2005/06=100) the overall median monthly earnings have almost remained the same over the survey periods.

2.3.3 Statistics on Working Children

Children aged less than 18 years accounted for 58.0 percent of the total population in 2011/12 (Statistical Appendix Table 2.3 C). 39 percent of the children aged 6-17 years (4.3 million in absolute terms) were involved in work and about 89 percent attended school in 2011/12.

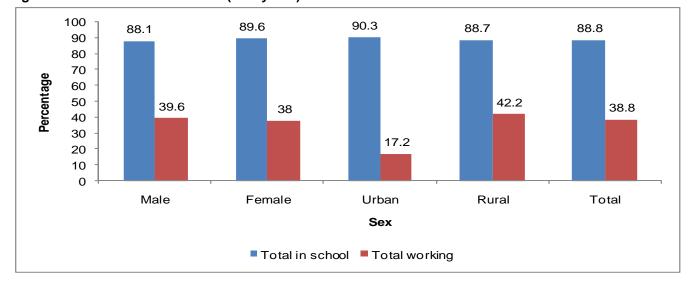


Figure 2.3.3: Activities of children (6-17 years)

The survey results further indicated that a total of 2 million children aged 5-17 years were in child labour (approximately 16 percent of the total children). In addition about 65 percent of children were involved in household chores. (See Statistical Appendix Table 2.3 C).

2.3.4 Youths Employment Indicators

The School to Work Transition Survey (SWTS) conducted by UBOS in 2011/12 targeted youth aged 18-30 years and studied challenges they face to accessing stable employment opportunities. The survey results showed that the national youth unemployment rate (relaxed definition) was 19.7 per cent. A youth is any person who is aged 18-30 years. Statistical Appendix Table 2.3 D indicates that there was total of 6.3 million youths in Uganda, out of whom females constitute 51 percent of the youth labour force. The youth's unemployment rate in Kampala was thrice (15 percent) the national youth unemployment rate, which underscores the difference in the structure of the urban and rural labour markets.

2.3.5 Advertised jobs in Newspaper

UBOS compiles data on jobs advertised in the two major English Newspapers (New Vision and Daily Monitor). The data from these advertisements is used as a proxy for demand for labour in the country. However, there exists un-advertised jobs (mainly elementary occupations as well as advertisements using other channels such as internal advertisements within institutions, website, radio, etc. The trend over time shows that there have been fluctuations in the number of jobs advertised since the year 2009.

2.3.5.1 Advertised Jobs by Professional

Over the period 2011-2014, most of the jobs advertised were for professionals (graduates), followed by the technicians and associate professionals. It should be noted that most jobs of professionals and associate professionals require being advertised before filling, while casual jobs may be filled without advertisement although they form the majority of the new jobs created. The detailed occupations of advertised jobs are illustrated in Statistical Appendix Table 2.3 E

2.3.5.2 Advertised Jobs by Industry

Industrial classification of advertised jobs presented is based on the ISIC Revision 3. Over the period 2010-2014, the majority of the jobs advertised were in the Public Administration sector (See Statistical Appendix Table 2.3 G). The share of the jobs advertised in the public administration remained at about 50 percent during 2013 and 2014. The results also show that only 8.7 percent of the advertisements were in the social sectors of health and education during 2014 compared to 11.3 percent in 2013.

Table 2.3.4 shows the job advertisements and the regions where the work place is situated. Overall, more than one half (55 percent) of the jobs advertised have their designated work places in Kampala district. The proportion is higher for clerks, plant and machine operators, as well as professionals.

2.3.6 Employment in the Civil Service

Employment in the civil service is composed of persons employed in the traditional civil service, teaching service (primary and secondary), police, prisons, public universities and the staff in Local Governments. The average size of the civil service in 2014 was 292,535 persons as indicated in Table 2.3.5. There was a minimal decline (less than one percent) compared to its size in 2013. The detailed monthly composition of the size of the civil service is indicated in Statistical Appendix Table 2.3 G. The results indicate that there is a declining trend in the number of traditional civil service from 2010. On the other hand there is an increasing trend in numbers in teaching service over the same period.

2.4 Household Expenditure and Poverty

Poverty eradication continues to be one of Uganda's key National development objectives. The National Development Plan (NDP) for the period 2010/11-2014/15 identifies poverty as one of the constraints to growth and development. In order to address the prevailing poverty concerns, it is important that mechanisms are instituted to frequently monitor the changes in the welfare of the population overtime. One of the approaches is to estimate the income or expenditure of households/individuals and establish thresholds below which one is considered poor or non-poor. The UNHS V and earlier surveys use household expenditure rather than income to measure the living standards of the Ugandan population.

2.4.1 Consumption Expenditure per Household

Table 2.4.1 presents the monthly consumption expenditure per household from three surveys after adjusting for inflation. Uganda's average household monthly expenditure in real terms, increased slightly from Ug Shs 232,700 in 2009/10 to Ug Shs 244,400 in 2012/13, representing a five percent increase during the period under review. Regional variations reveal that, whereas the Central, Western and Northern regions realized increases in consumption expenditure, Kampala and the Eastern region registered a decline in real monthly consumption expenditure per household between 2009/10 and 2012/13.

2.4.2 Mean Consumption Expenditure Per Capita

Table 2.4.2 presents the mean monthly consumption expenditure per capita after accounting for inflation. Overall, the mean consumption expenditure per capita increased to about Ug Shs 50,900 from Ug Shs 47,200 between 2009/10 and 2012/13. The Western region registered the highest growth in mean consumption expenditure per capita of 27.3 percent followed by Northern region (9.6 percent). The Central and Eastern regions registered an increase in mean consumption expenditure per capita of 8.2 percent and 2.9 percent respectively. The increase in consumption expenditure per capita was largely observed in Western-rural (14.9 percent). Urban areas on the other hand, did not register notable growth in mean consumption expenditure per capita compared to rural areas. Most urban areas registered a decline in mean consumption expenditure per capita.

2.4.3 Share of Household Expenditure by Item Group

The trends in the share of each item group in the total household expenditure including non-consumption expenditures are presented in Table 2.4.3. The results show that, overall, the share of food, drinks and tobacco in total household expenditure was the highest (46.0 percent) and has largely remained unchanged over the three survey periods; followed by expenditure on rent, fuel and energy (15.6 percent). Increases were registered in the non-consumption; and household and personal goods categories between 2009/10 and 2012/13.

Rural-urban variations show that the share of food, drinks and tobacco in rural areas remained almost unchanged while that of urban areas increased by six percentage points between 2009/10 and 2012/13. The share of the household monthly expenditure on personal goods and on non-consumption expenditure increased by about one percentage point while the share of expenditure on education and health declined by about the same magnitude.

2.4.4 Poverty Trend Estimates

Table 2.4.4 presents poverty statistics for the survey year 2012/13. Three poverty indicators: namely P0, P1 and P2 (see Foster, Greer and Thorbecke, 1984) are reported. Data are disaggregated by location, residence and regions. Along with the poverty statistics, we report the percentage of people in each location, their mean household consumption per adult equivalent and the contribution each location makes to each poverty statistic (i.e. what percentage of national poverty is attributable to each location). Given that poverty statistics are estimates, it is useful to test whether changes in their values are statistically significant (Kakwani, 1990).

Based on the 2012/13 survey, it was estimated that 19.7 percent of Ugandans are poor, corresponding to nearly 6.7 million persons. Table 2.4.4 provides more detailed statistics, broken down by region and rural-urban status. The incidence of poverty remains higher in rural areas than in urban areas. The poor in the rural areas represent 22.8 percent of the population compared to only 9.3 percent in the urban areas. The rural areas with about 77.4 percent of the population constitute 89.3 percent of national poverty. On the other hand, the urban areas represent 22.6 percent of the population and constitute 10.7 percent of national poverty.

Decomposing the total national poverty by region reveals that incidence of income poverty varies significantly. The regional ranking is consistent with the previous poverty works on Uganda. The incidence of poverty remains highest in the Northern region (43.7%) and least in the Central region (4.7%). Clearly, the incidence of poverty in the Northern and Eastern regions is much higher than the national average of 19.7 percent.

Analysis of the poverty trends in Table 2.4.4 reveals that, the percentage of people living in absolute poverty declined by 4.8 percentage points between 2005/09 and 2012/13. The overall decline is statistically significant as was the case during the period between 2005/06 and 2009/10. The other poverty indicators (P1 and P2)

follow a similar trend as the headcount index and are equally statistically significant. The incidence of income poverty for Uganda as a whole declined between 2009/10 and 2012/13 irrespective of the indicator used (P0, P1, or P2).

2.4.5 Income Inequality

The distribution of income across individuals shows who benefits or misses out on the development opportunities available to society. The Gini coefficient is one of the measures for income inequality. Table 2.4.6 shows that, overall, income inequality as measured by the Gini coefficient stood at 0.395 in 2012/13 which was a decrease from 0.426 in 2009/10. Decomposition by residence reveals that inequality was largely driven by urban areas (from 0.375 in 2009/10 to 0.410 in 2012/13). The findings further show a notable reduction in income inequality in the Central and Western regions while an increase was observed in the Northern and Eastern regions.

2.4.6 Changes in Poverty Status (2011/12-2013/14)

The Uganda Bureau of Statistics also conducts Panel Surveys with the objective of providing high quality nationally representative information on income dynamics at the household level as well as annual information on service delivery and consumption expenditure estimates to monitor poverty and service outcomes in interim years of other National Surveys like the UNHSs. Table 2.4.7 presents the welfare status of Uganda for the Panel survey period 2011/12 to 2013/14 disaggregated by selected population characteristics.

Poverty has been measured using monetary methods of welfare such as consumption expenditure. However, the multi-dimensional nature of poverty calls for complementary measures to fully understand poverty. This entails considering a combination of measures of wellbeing, for instance education, health, vulnerability and deprivation. In addition, panel surveys have demonstrated that poverty is not static and that, instead, poor people and indeed households change their state depending on several factors. Some households and people stay in poverty over an extended period of time while others move into and out of poverty overtime. This section highlights changes in poverty over the panel survey period.

Table 2.4.7 presents the state of welfare from the survey period 2011/12 to 2013/14 disaggregated by selected population groups. Overall, 17.7 percent of the population in Uganda was chronically poor across the survey

periods 2011/12 and 2013/14. The chronically poor were residing in rural areas (20.6%) and (32.8%) of their household heads had no formal education. Majority (26.3%) of the chronically poor were residing in the Northern region of Uganda. On the other hand, people who experienced mobility into poverty between 2011/12 and 2013/14 were mainly from the Eastern followed by Northern regions. However, overall, more than half of the households remained non-poor (51.0%) over the two panel survey periods. The majority of those households that who remained non-poor had post-secondary education.

2.5 Public Health

This section presents statistics on some of the key aspects of public health. These include status of healthcare facilities, immunisation coverage, morbidity and other selected health sector performance indicators.

2.5.1 Health Facilities

Health facilities in Uganda include hospitals and health centres (II, III and IV). The number of functional healthcare facilities has generally been on the increase in recent years. Table 2.5.1 shows that there were 5,229 functional health facilities as of June 2012. Statistical Appendix Table 2.4A shows ownership status of functional healthcare facilities by district in the year 2012/13. The table shows that more than a quarter of the health facilities are located in Kampala. Four (4) other districts have more than 100 health facilities and these include Wakiso, Jinja, Kabale and Kasese. Kampala also has the highest number of private health facilities outside the city, Jinja district has the highest number (46) of private health facilities while Rukungiri has the highest number (35) of health facilities owned by NGOs compared to all the other districts in the country.

2.5.2 Staffing levels for Health workers

The staffing levels presented in Table 2.5.2 include both the trained health workers, administrative and support staff in government health facilities. Table 2.5.2, shows that the staffing levels in public health facilities stood at 69 percent in 2013/14, which, is still below the Health Sector Strategic Invesment Plan (HSSIP) target (70 percent) for the year.

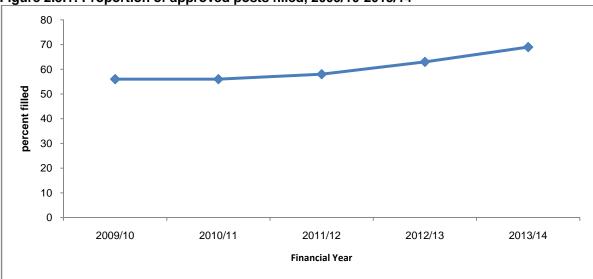


Figure 2.5.1: Proportion of approved posts filled, 2009/10-2013/14

Figure 2.5.1 shows the pattern of proportion of approved posts in health facilities that have been filled over the recent years. Since 2009/10 there is an observed slow increase in the percentage of posts filled in public health facilities.

2.5.3 Immunisation Coverage

Information on routine immunisation is collected from health facilities in the country. The antigens given include; BCG (against tuberculosis), DPT-HepB-Hib (against Diphtheria, Pertusis, Tetanus, Hepatitis B, Haemophilias influenzae), Oral Polio Vaccine (OPV) against poliomyelitis and a measles vaccine.

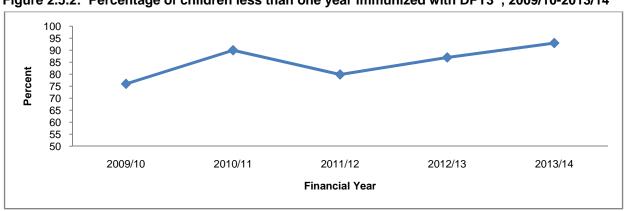


Figure 2.5.2: Percentage of children less than one year immunized with DPT3 , 2009/10-2013/14

Coverage of DPT3 is used as one of the core indicators to measure coverage and quality of health care in Uganda. Figure 2.5.2 presents the percentage of children less than one year immunized with the third dose Pentavalent vaccine (DPT 3). DPT3 coverage was 93 percent in 2013/14, which is above the annual target of 83 percent. Statistical Appendix Table 2.5B gives antigen specific immunisation rates for the various districts for the financial year 2013/14. The table shows that Kyegegwa district has the lowest percentage (20 percent) of fully immunised children. Note that some districts have rates that are over 100 percent because they immunized more children than the number of children (below one year old) estimated to be in the district.

2.5.4 Morbidity

Table 2.5.3 shows that over the recent years, Malaria has been the leading cause of morbidity in Uganda followed by Cough or Cold. In the Financial Year 2013/14, these two accounted for 60 percent of the morbidity. The number of persons with acute diarrhoea has slightly increased from about 1.4 million in 2012/13 to 1.5 million in 2013/14.

2.5.3.1 Cancer Related Morbidity

According to the Health Sector Strategic Plan (HSSP) 2010/11-2014/15, Uganda is one of the countries with a very high morbidity and mortality due to cancer. Under the strategy for non-communicable diseases, there is need to generate a national strategy for cancer control with emphasis on cancer prevention. Among the indicators and targets for the HSSP, is to establish two population based cancer registries and a national cancer database by 2015. Currently, information on cancer patients is compiled by the Uganda Cancer Institute at Mulago Hospital.

Table 2.5.4 highlights the information on cancer patients who seek treatment at the Uganda Cancer Institute. The data shows that the number of patients has steadily increased over the last 5 years from 1,604 in 2010 to 2,220 in 2014. Over the years, there have been more female patients than male patients except for 2011. The data also shows that the number of patients for cancer treatment is higher in the older age groups than in the young age-groups.

2.5.5 Health Facility Based Mortality

A total of 31,868 Health facility deaths (in-patients) were reported in the FY 2013/14. Table 2.5.5, shows that malaria has been the leading cause of mortality among in-patients in Uganda for the last three years. This pattern has changed for persons aged 5 years and above whose leading cause of death is Tuberculosis (15.8 percent) followed by malaria (9.4 percent). A higher proportion of those over 5 died due to injuries from road traffic accidents (2.9 percent) and Cardiovascular Diseases (2.9 percent) compared to the under 5. The proportion of death due to Tuberculosis among persons aged 5 years and above has more than doubled in the last one year, from 6.4 percent to 15.8 percent. On the other hand, the leading cause of death among persons aged below 5 years is malaria (19.9 percent) followed by pneumonia (12.4 percent) and anaemia (12.2 percent).

2.5.6 Health Sector Performance Assessment

The Ministry of Health has identified a set of indicators to assess the performance of the Health Sector at the Local Government level. They are divided into management indicators, coverage and quality of care indicators. Composite index is computed by weighting the agreed upon indicators. The coverage and quality of care indicators are given a collective weight 97.5 percent and the management indicators account for 25 percent. Each indicator is assigned a weight whose sum constitutes the performance on a scale of 100 percent. This set of indicators is presented in table 2.5.5. Statistical Appendix tables 2.4F present a trend of selected health sector indicators at district level.

The indicators that almost achieved universal coverage inthe financial year 2013/14 included timely submission of medicine orders 99.0 percent, outpatient department visit per capita 1.0 and percent of children born to HIV positive women who are tested 97.5 percent. The worst performing indicators under coverage and quality of health care are in maternal health care i.e. deliveries in health facilities 44.0 percent, intake of 2nd dose of Intermittent Presumptive Treatment 48.6 percent and attendance of the 4th Antenatal Care visit 32.4 percent.

2.6 Crime Statistics

Crime statistics are very useful in implementing effective and proactive strategies of fighting crime and its after effects. This chapter presents data on various forms of crime and remedial measures as compiled by the Uganda Police Force;

2.6.1 Police Statistics

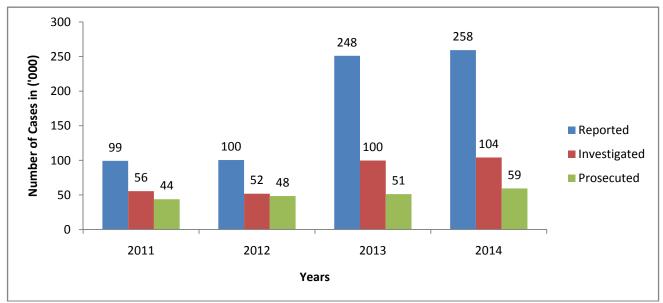


Figure 2.6.1: Number of Crimes by category ('000s)

Figure 2.6.1 shows information on the number of reported, investigated and prosecuted crimes. The number of crimes reported to Police annually has gradually increased between 2011 and 2014. There was no pronounced change in the number of investigated cases between 2011 and 2014. A similar trend is seen in prosecuted cases during the same period. See details in Statistical Appendix table 2.5 A

2.6.2 Serious crimes Investigated

Uganda Police categorises crime into serious and non-serious. It categorises serious crimes to include homicides, aggravated robbery, defilement, murder, rape, burglary, child stealing and child trafficking. Table 2.6.1 shows that about 20,000 serious crimes were investigated in 2014. Defilement was the most common serious crime accounting for more than half of all the serious crimes in 2014. Over all, there has been a slight increase in the total number of investigated serious crimes between 2013 and 2014. See details in Statistical Appendix Table 2.5 A.

2.6.3 Traffic and Road Safety

This section covers information on traffic crashes, causalities, accident victims, vehicles involved in road accidents, causes of road accidents and also the time of crash.

a) Reported Road Traffic Crashes.

A Fatal accident is defined as one in which death occurs at the scene of the accident and/or within one year or one day as a result of injuries sustained in the accident; A Serious accident is defined as an accident in which a person is admitted in the hospital as an "in-patient" or any of the following injuries are sustained whether or not one is admitted in the hospital: fractures, concussion, internal injuries, crashing, severe cuts and lacerations. A Minor accident on the other hand is defined as a damage only accident where no persons are injured at all regardless of the extent of damage on the vehicle. Table 2.6.2 shows that about half of the accidents in 2014 were serious. The Uganda Police Force recorded a total of about 19, 000 road traffic crashes in 2014 as shown in Table 2.6.2. Although the number of crashes was decreasing between 2011 and 2013, an increase (2 percent) was registered in 2014 compared to 2013.

b) Casualties of traffic crashes

The accident severity index measures the seriousness of an accident. It is defined as the number of persons killed per 100 accidents. Table 2.6.3 indicates that there were a total of 17,848 casualties from road traffic crashes in 2014, an increase of 3 percent from the number of traffic casualties in 2013. The Table also indicates that the most common causalities in 2014 were serious injuries (50 Percent). Over all, findings show that the Accident Severity Index (ASI) was 15.9 in 2014, implying that 15 persons die in every 100 accidents that occur in Uganda.

d) Timing of road accidents

It has been observed that the time of the day has a strong bearing on the possibility of occurrence of accidents. Table 2.6.5 indicates that in 2014, 27.1 percent of road accident crashes occurred between 4:00pm-7:59pm. The lowest occurrence was between 12:00 to 3.59am in the morning with 5.5 percent partly due to less traffic at that time.

f) Causes of road accidents

Table 2.6.7 indicates that the leading cause of road accidents in 2014 was Careless driving (43 percent), indicating an increase of 10 percent from 2013. Driving under the influence of drinks/drugs registered the highest increase (49 percent) while accidents due to careless pedestrians and those related to passengers falling from vehices registered a decrease of (26 percent).

2.6.5 Prison Statistics

The Uganda Prisons Service compiles information on a number of prisoners by category. These include, those convicted and prisoners on remand. Table 2.6.9 indicates a total of about 42,000 prisoners' in 2014, reflecting an increase of 10 percent from 2013. Prisoners on remand in 2014 were the majority accounting for more than half (55.0 percent) of the prison population. See Appendix Table 2.5 C & D.

The incarceration rate gives the number of prisoners per 100,000 populations. Table 2.6.9 further indicates that the Incarceration Rate for 2014 stood at 121 per 100,000 persons. The Incarceration Rate has been on the increase since 2010.

2.6.6 Prison Capacity

Overcrowding in prison cells is a serious violation of prisoners' constitutional human rights since prisoners need a convenient environment that is not over crowded. Table 2.6.10 shows high levels of overcrowding in prison cells across all regions in the country. The national Occupancy Rate in 2014 was 262 percent implying that, there were 262 prisoners in every space meant for 100 prisoners. Regionally, wide variations were observed; outside Kampala city. The western region had the highest occupancy rate (299 percent) while Eastern region had the lowest rate (172 percent). The population of inmates serving a sentence of 24 months and over was about quarter of the total prison population as seen from Table 2.6.10.

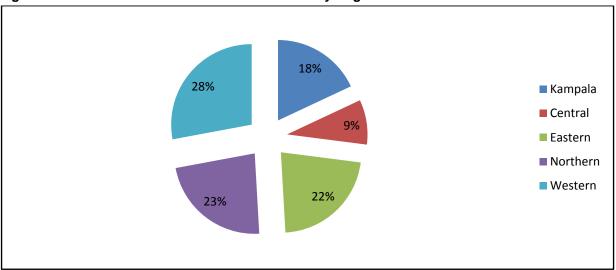

A total of 222 Babies were staying with their mothers in prisons. Figure 2.6.2 indicates that western region had the highest proportion of babies in prisons while the least was central region with 28 and nine percent respectively.

2.6.7 Deaths in Prison

Table 2.6.11 shows that there were 227 prison deaths in 2013, an increase of 83 percent compared to the prison deaths that occurred in 2012. The table further shows that the Western region registered the highest deaths in prison (33 Percent) compared to other regions.

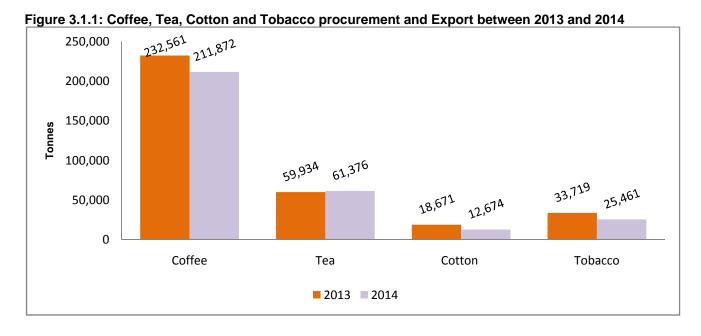
3.0 PRODUCTION STATISTICS

3.1 Agriculture and fisheries

This section presents statistics on food crop area and production, traditional cash crop production, livestock, livestock products and fish catch.

3.1.1 Traditional Cash Crops

The traditional cash crops of Uganda include: Coffee, Tea, Cotton and Tobacco. Uganda produces two kinds of coffee that is; Arabica and Robusta. Over the years, Robusta coffee has been produced in much more quantities compared to Arabica coffee also known as mountain coffee. In 2014, a total of 211,872 tonnes of coffee was procured marking a reduction of about one percent from that procured in 2013. Cotton and Tobacco were 12,700 tonnes and 25,500 tonnes respectively, registering reductions of 32 percent and 25 percent respectively. On other hand, Tea production (61, 000 tonnes) increased slightly by less than one percent in 2014. Statistical Appendix Table 3.1 A gives procurement and Export data on Traditional Cash crops for the period 2010 – 2014

3.1.2 Area and production of Food Crops, 2014

Uganda grows about 16 major crops according to the Uganda Census of Agriculture (UCA) 2008/09. These include Cereals (Maize, Millet, Sorghum, Rice); Root crops (Cassava, Sweet potatoes, Irish potatoes); Pulses (Beans, Cow peas, Field peas, Pigeon peas); and Oil crops (Groundnuts, Soya beans, Sim sim), Plantains; and Coffee. However, wheat is included in this publication because it has increasingly become a major crop in Uganda as it has been in rest of East Africa.

Total area under selected: Cereals (1,762,000 Ha), Pulses (762,000 Ha), Oil crops (918,000 Ha) and Plantains (974,100 Ha). Area sown under plantain and pulses increased by less than one percent for each of the crops specified while area sown under cereals increased by two percent for Rice and two percent for Wheat. Apart from Irish potatoes whose area increased by one percent, the rest of the roots both area under Sweet potatoes and Cassava increased by less than one percent. In addition, area under each of the selected pulses also increased by less than one percent while among selected oil crops area sown for increased by three percent for sun flower and one percent for ground nuts. See Appendix Table 3.1 B.

Production of Plantains increased from 4,375 tonnes in 2013 to 4,578 tonnes (that is 4.7 percent) in 2014. There was a general increase in the production of cereals: Millet (3.9 percent), Rice (10.9 percent) and wheat (8.8 percent) except Maize and Sorghum whose production increased by less than one percent each. Roots and tubers that is Cassava and Irish potatoes had mixed fortunes with a decrease of 5.7 percent and an increase of 3.4 percent respectively, while Sweet potatoes production increased by 2.9 percent. There was a general decline in production of Beans (6.9 percent), Field peas (33.3 percent) and Cow peas (19.9 percent) in 2014. Oil crops also had increases of less than one percent, except sun flower which had an increment of three percent. See Statistical Appendix Table 3.1 C.

3.1.2.1 Crop Area and Production by region and district, UCA 2008/09

Results from the UCA 2008/09 showed that the Eastern region was the biggest producer of Finger millet (106,838 tonnes), Maize (1,108,554 tonnes), Rice (128,195 tonnes), Sweet potatoes (847,140 tonnes) and Cassava (1,061,186 tonnes). The Northern region led in the production of Sorghum (177,088 tonnes), Field peas (10,428 tonnes), Pigeon peas (11,031 tonnes), Groundnuts (83,182 tonnes), Soyabeans (15,727 tonnes) and simsim (93,562 tonnes) while the Western region led in the production of Beans (411,945 tonnes) and all types of Banana (2,883,648 tonnes). See Statistical Appendix Table 3.1 D.

Within western region, Isingiro district had the highest plantain Banana production in the country (601,363 tonnes). The districts with the highest production of plantain Banana in the Central, Eastern, Northern and Western regions were Mubende (204,109 tonnes), Mbale (99,011 tonnes), Arua (17,106 tonnes) and Isingiro (601,363 tonnes) respectively.

The highest Maize production in the country was reported in the district of Iganga with 303,262 tonnes. The districts with the highest production of Maize in the Central, Eastern, Northern and Western regions were Mubende (171,089 tonnes), Iganga (303,262 tonnes), Adjumani (47,264 tonnes) and Kabarole (91,318 tonnes) respectively.

The highest Sweet Potatoes production in the country was reported in the district of Iganga with 270,853 tonnes. The districts with the highest production of Sweet Potatoes in the Central, Eastern, Northern and Western regions were Nakasongola (66,419 tonnes), Iganga (270,853 tonnes), Gulu (61,732 tonnes) and Kyenjojo (40,148 tonnes) respectively.

The highest Cassava production in the country was reported in the district of Apac with 239,932 tonnes. The districts with the highest production of Cassava in the Central, Eastern, Northern and Western regions were Masaka (64,965 tonnes), Tororo (174,962 tonnes), Apac (239,932 tonnes) and Hoima (60,932 tonnes) respectively.

Ntungamo district with reported the highest Beans production in the country (137,899 tonnes). The districts with the highest production of Beans in the Central, Eastern, Northern and Western regions were Mubende (78,027 tonnes), Mbale (23,637 tonnes), Amuru (74,671 tonnes) and Ntungamo (137,899 tonnes) respectively.

The highest level of Groundnut production in the country was reported in the district of Soroti (19,599 tonnes). The districts with the highest production of Groundnuts in the Central, Eastern, Northern and Western regions were Nakasongola (19,183 tonnes), Soroti (19,599 tonnes), Amuru (14,375 tonnes) and Kibaale (12,473 tonnes).

3.1.3 Fish catch by water body

Fisheries activities are mainly carried out in open water sources and provide an important source of livelihood for many people in Uganda. Open Water cover 15.1 percent of Uganda's total surface area and this comprises five major lakes (Victoria, Albert, Kyoga, Edward and George), which are a main contributor to capture fisheries in the country.

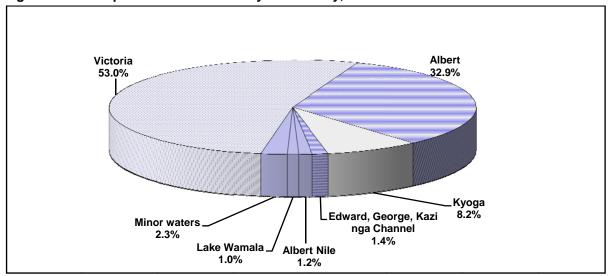


Figure 3.1.2: Proportion of Fish catch by Water body, 2014

Lake Victoria continues to be the most important water body in Uganda both in size and contribution to the fish catch. Its share of catch was 45.9 percent in 2013 and 53.0 percent in 2014. This was followed by Lake Albert, and then Lake Kyoga as seen in Figure 3.1.2 F. Though the share of fish catch for Lakes Albert and Kyoga reduced from 38.2 percent and 9.5 percent in 2013 to 32.9 percent and 8.2 percent in 2014 respectively. There was an increase in the fish catch for Lake Victoria in the year 2014 to 245 thousand tonnes from 193 thousand tones in 2013. Lakes: Albert, Kyoga and Edward recorded a decrease during the period under review. However, Lakes: George, Albert Nile, Wamala, Kazinga channel and minor waters also recorded an increase in the fish catch during the period under review. It is worth noting that the over 94 percent of the fish catch is harvested from Lakes: Victoria, Albert and Kyoga. The details of fish catch data by water body for the period 2010 to 2014 are shown in Statistical Appendix Table 3.1 E.

Increase in catch from Lake Victoria is due to increase in catch for Silver Fish (Mukene) whereas the decline in Albert and Kyoga's fish catch is due to the use of illegal, destructive and banned fishing gears and methods. The changes in fish catch in Lakes: George, Wamala and Albert Nile were not significant.

3.1.4 Livestock

Cattle and poultry numbers increased by about 3.0 percent and 2.5 percent respectively between 2013 and 2014 while goat, sheep and pig numbers reduced by 2.9 percent in the same period. Reduction in goat, sheep and pig numbers was as a result of many being exported to southern Sudan. Figure 3.1.4 shows the trend in the growth of all livestock categories. Statistical Appendix Table 3.1 E provides data on livestock numbers by type for the period 2010 -2014.

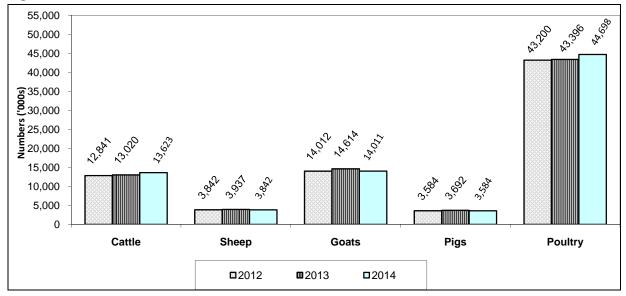


Figure 3.1.3: Livestock Numbers 2012- 2014

3.1.4.1 Number of Cattle and Poultry by breed in 2010 - 2014

The indigenous breeds continue to be dominant over the exotic ones for both cattle and poultry as seen in Table 3.1.1. There were 12,709 million indigenous cattle (93.3 percent) compared to 914,000 (6.7 percent) exotic ones. Regarding poultry, indigenous were 39,206 million (87.7 percent) while exotic were 5,492 million constituting 12.3 percent as shown in Table 3.1.1.

3.1.5 Beef, Milk and Egg production

This sub-section presents data on beef, milk and eggs production based on Livestock Census 2008.

The production of beef in 2014 was estimated to be 202, 929 metric tonnes which increased from 197,019 Metric tonnes in 2013. Beef production has registered a steady increase of 3.0 percent over the years as seen in Figure 3.2.5a. The details are shown in Statistical appendix, Table 3.1 G.

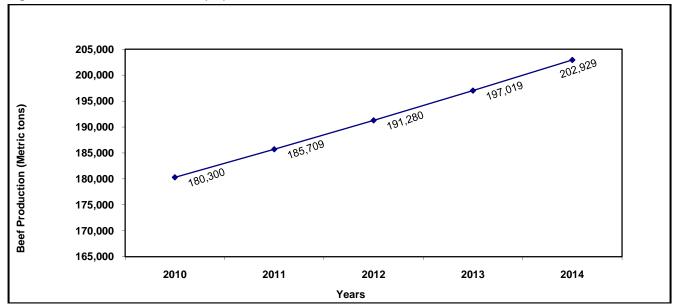


Figure 3.1.5a: Beef Production (Mt):

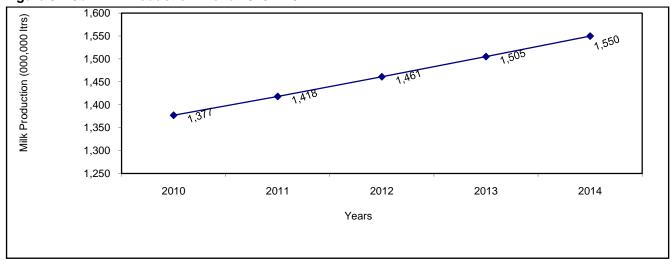
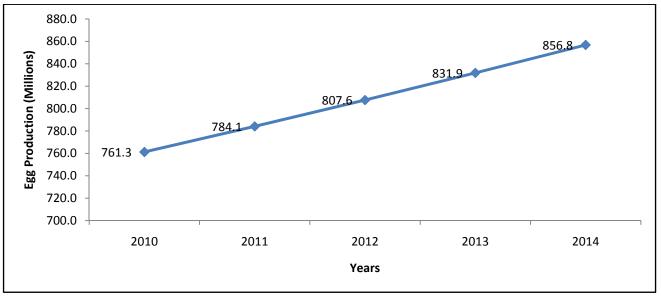


Figure 3.1.5b: Milk Production Trend 2010 - 2014:

There was a steady increase in the milk production for the past four years as shown in figure 3.1.5b with production increasing from 1,505 million litres in 2013 to 1,550 million litres in 2014. The details are shown in Statistical appendix, Table 3.1 H

There was 3.0 percent increase in egg production of in 2014 from 831.9 million observed in 2013 to 856.8 million. This trend was similar to that observed between 2012 and 2013. 3.2 Industry Statistics

3.2.1 Index of Production (Manufacturing)

The Index of Production (IoP) for the manufacturing sector measures changes in the volume of goods produced by the manufacturing sector in the economy. Monthly data is collected on a quarterly basis from manufacturing establishments that contribute about 80 percent of manufacturing value added. The index is then computed for eight broad groups as shown in Table 3.2.1 below.

The Index of Production recorded for the year 2014 was 219.0. This was a 10.0 percent increase compared to 2.9 percent increase for the year 2013. As in the previous year, the 'Food Processing' group registered the highest increase of 19.8 percent, followed by Miscellaneous group 15.4 percent and Drinks and Tobacco group by 10.3 percent. It should be noted however, that three groups recorded negative growth, i.e. Textiles Clothing and Foot Wear (16.2 percent), Sawmilling paper and Printing (12.6 percent) and Bricks and Cement (3.3 percent). Detailed indices by groups and categories are shown in Statistical Appendix Tables 3.2 A and 3.2 B.

3.3 Energy Statistics

This section presents statistics on sources and use of energy available in Uganda which are either locally produced or imported. The section also provides statistics and information on import and sales of petroleum products and generation as well as distribution of electricity in the country.

3.3.1 Import of petroleum products

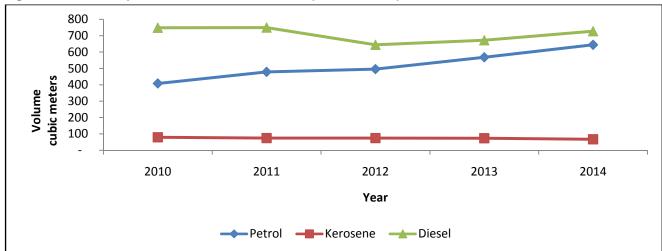


Figure 3.3.1: Imports of Petroleum Products (cubic meters), 2010-2014

The petroleum products include Premium Motor Spirit (PMS), Automotive Gas Oil (AGO - diesel), Bulk Illuminating Kerosene (BIK), Liquidefied Petroleum Gas (LPG), Aviation fuel, Fuel oil, Bitumen, Lubricants and IDO. The main petroleum import volumes that are monitored are Petrol, Diesel and Kerosene. Figure 3.3.1 shows that there was a 13.4 percent and 8.2 percent increase in the import volume of petrol and diesel respectively in 2014 compared to 2013 and an 8.4 percent decrease in the import volume of kerosene in 2014 compared to 2013. For details, see Statistical Appendix Table 3.3.A.

3.3.2 Sales of Petroleum Products

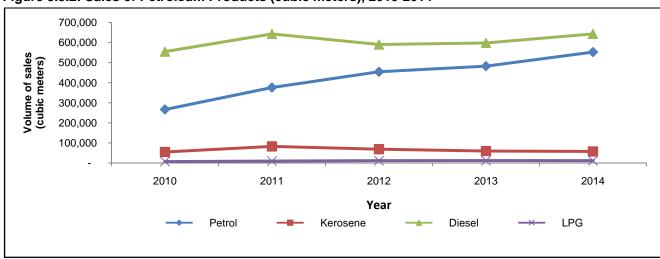


Figure 3.3.2: Sales of Petroleum Products (cubic meters), 2010-2014

There was a 14.6 percent and 7.5 percent increase in the volume of sales of petrol and diesel respectively and a 3.3 percent decrease in the volume of sales of kerosene in 2014 compared to 2013 as shown in Figure 3.3.2 below. For details, see Statistical Appendix Table 3.3.B.

3.3.3 Annual Average retail Prices for Petroleum Products

Table 3.3.1 shows the average annual retail price changes for selected petroleum products. The findings show that between 2010 and 2014, the prices for Petrol and Diesel increased by 29 percent, 40 percent respectively.

3.3.4 Electricity

3.3.4.1 Installed Capacity

The total installed capacity of electricity power plants increased by 4.8 percent from 827.5 MW in 2013 to 867.0 MW in 2014. This was due to a 0.5 percent increase in the installed capacity of hydro electricity from 691.5 MW in 2013 to 695.0 MW in 2014 and a 36.0 percent increase in the installed capacity of Thermal electricity from 100 MW in 2013 to 136 MW in 2014 as shown in Statistical Appendix Table 3.3.C and Figure 3.3.5.1 below.

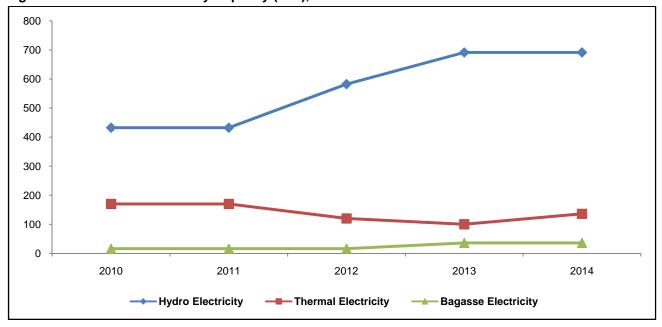


Figure 3.3.3: Installed Electricity Capacity (MW), 2010-2014

3.3.4.2 Electricity generation

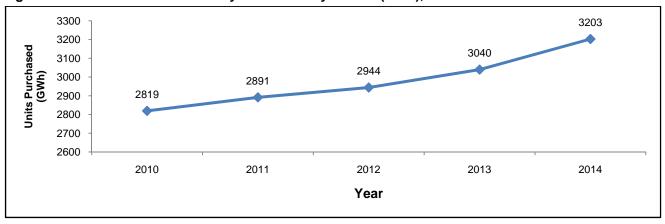
Uganda generates electricity from hydroelectric power stations located at Nalubaale, Bujagali and Kiira Power Stations (formally Owen falls dam) in Jinja. In addition, there are thermal, mini and micro-hydro power stations located in the country which either contribute to the national power grid or directly serve specific communities and individuals. These include Kisiizi Hospital mini Hydro power plant, Kihihi generation plant for thermal power, and the West Nile Rural Electrification Company (WENRECO) thermal plant among others.

Electricity is also supplied to the main grid by the thermal generators and some from Bagasse plants. Uganda also imports some electric power from Rwanda as a cost effective measure to serve Kisoro town which is nearer the grid from Rwanda than to the one in Uganda. Some of the generated power is exported to neighbouring Kenya, Tanzania and Rwanda.

3.3.4.3 Electricity Purchases

The total units of electricity purchased by the Uganda Electricity Transmission Company increased by 5.4 percent from 3,040 GWh in 2013 to 3,203 GWh in 2014 as shown in Figure 3.3.3 below. For more details, see Statistical Appendix Table 3.3 D.

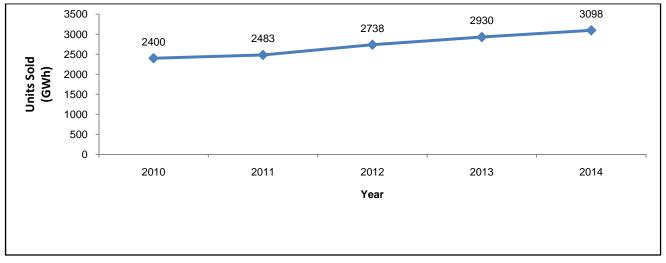
Figure 3.3.4: Total Units of Electricity Purchased by UETCL (GWh), 2010 - 2014

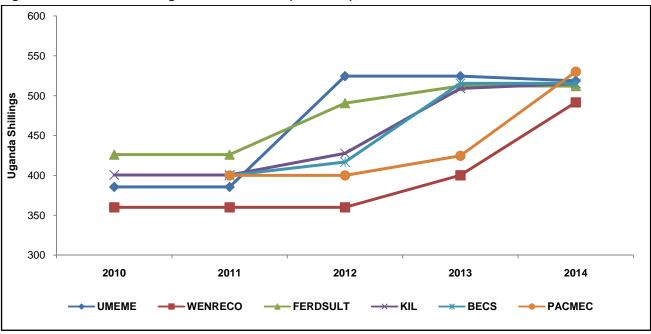

3.4 Building and Construction Statistics

3.4.1 Building Statistics

This section presents information on Building Plans Submitted, Plans Approved and Occupation Permits issued from 25 Municipalities and 60 Town Councils across the country. The geographical coverage is progressively increasing as expansion of data collection and coverage is made over the years for all municipalities and town councils in the country. Data on building plans is collected on Residential, Commercial, Industrial and Institutional buildings, as well as other structures. Institutional buildings include schools, hospitals and office buildings while other structures include mosques, churches and those not elsewhere categorised. The data provided herein covers the period 2009 to 2013.

3.4.1.1 Building Plans Submitted

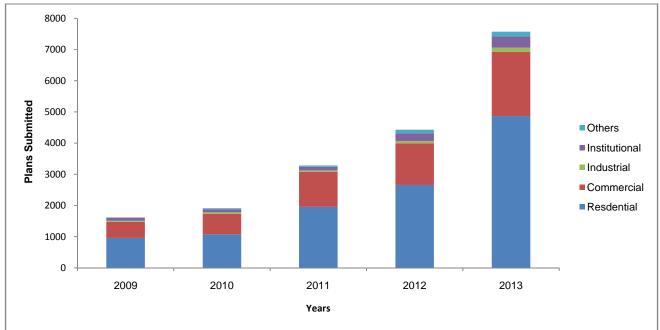
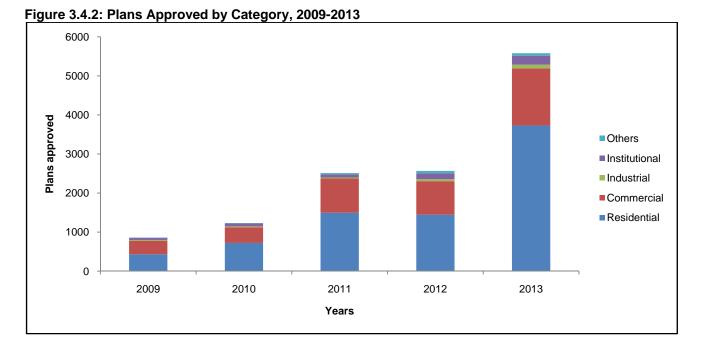


Figure 3.4.1: Plans Submitted, by Category, 2009-2013

As shown in Figure 3.4.1 below, the total number of Plans Submitted progressively increased from 1,912 Plans in the year 2010 to 7,573 Plans in 2013. This increase was mainly driven by increase in Residential and Commercial Plans Submitted. Residential Plans increased from 2,657 Plans in 2012 to 4,868 Plans in 2013 representing 83.2 percent. On the other hand, Commercial Plans Submitted increased from 1,337 in 2012 to 2,057 plans in 2013 respectively. Although Industrial buildings and other structures have generally increased since 2009, they still present lower numbers (Statistical Appendix Table 3.4 A).

3.4.1.2 Building Plans Approved

As shown in Figure 3.4.2 below, the total number of Plans Approved progressively increased from 861 in 2009 to 5,581 Plans in 2013. The number of Plans Approved registered a 117 percent increase from 2,566 in 2012 to 5,581 in 2013. The increase was mainly due to an increase in Residential Plans Approved that more than doubled from 1,444 Plans to 3,729 Plans and Commercial Plans from 860 Plans to 1,464 Plans. See details in Statistical Appendix Table 3.4 B.



3.4.1.3 Occupation Permits Issued

Occupational Permits issued declined between 2012 & 2013 by 8.9 percent. Only 226 Occupational Permits were issued in 2013 (Statistical Appendix Table 3.4C).

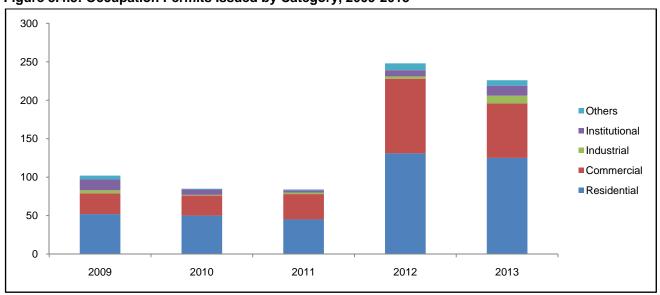


Figure 3.4.3: Occupation Permits Issued by Category, 2009-2013

3.4.2 Cement Production and Supply

This section presents data on Production, Imports, Exports and Net Domestic Supply (NDS) of cement in the economy for the period 2010 to 2014. Net Domestic Supply is a proxy of growth in the construction sector. Total Net Domestic Supply of cement registered a 17.2 percent increase from 1,752 thousand tonnes in 2013 to 2,053 thousand tonnes in 2014 because cement production increased from 2,023 thousand tonnes in 2014 to 2,141 thousand tonnes in 2014. Also Cement imports increased to 397 thousand tonnes in 2014 from 322 thousand tonnes in 2013, representing a 23.4 percent increase, while Exports registered a decrease from 593 thousand tonnes in 2013 to 485 thousand tonnes in 2014, representing 18.6 percent decline.

3.5 Mineral Statistics

This section presents statistics on production, exports and imports of minerals in Uganda. Mineral statistics are categorized under two sections and these include; Metallic minerals and Non metallic minerals.

3.5.1: Mineral production by quantity

There was an increase in the production of minerals in 2014 as compared to 2013. The production of limestone increased by 18.2 percent from 922 thousand tonnes in 2013 to 1,090 thousand tonnes in 2014 and the quantity of Pozollana increased by 19.1 percent from 623 thousand tonnes in 2013 to 742 thousand tonnes in 2014 as seen in Statistical Appendix Table 3.5.A.

3.5.2: Mineral production by value

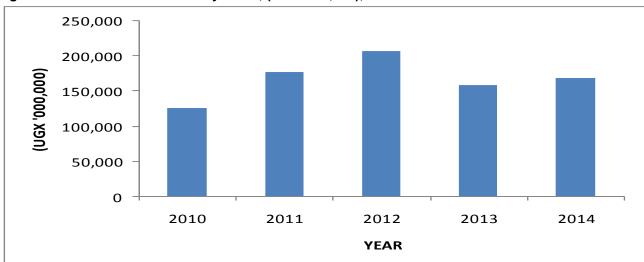


Figure 3.5.1: Mineral Production by Value, (UGX '000,000), 2010-2014

Figure 3.5.1 shows the value of the mineral production for selected minerals in Uganda from 2010-2014. The results show that there was a 6.2 percent increase in the total value of the minerals produced from 158 billion in 2013 to 168 billion in 2014. For details, see Statistical Appendix Table 3.5.B.

3.6 Transport Statistics

This section deals with transport statistics which include road and air services.

3.6.1 National Roads Network

The Uganda road network is categorized into four categories namely; National Roads, District Roads, Urban Roads and Community Access Roads. These are further sub-divided into two types which are paved roads and unpaved roads. However, the information presented in this section is for national roads only.

The total length of paved roads increased from 3,489.6 km in 2013 to 3,795 km in 2014 and unpaved ones decreased from 17,510.4 km in 2013 to 17,202.0 km in 2014 as shown in the table below.

The total number of private vehicles registered increased by 38.7 percent in 2013, however there was a 4.9 percent decrease from 133,945 in 2013 to 127,398 in 2014 as shown in the table below.

3.6.3 Government licensed motor vehicles

The number of vehicles licensed by the government decreased by 63.3 percent in 2014, this was due to a decline in the number of vehicles bought by the government from 730 vehicles in 2013 to 268 vehicles in 2014. Some categories of vehicles were not licensed at all in 2014 for instance Lorries, tractors, trailers and ambulances. Motorcycles had a significant decrease of 97.8 percent. (See Statistical Appendix Table 3.6A)

3.6.4 Air Transport

This sub section presents data on the movement of passengers, cargo and commercial aircrafts through Entebbe International Airport.

3.6.4.1 Passenger Air transport

The total number of passengers passing through Entebbe International Airport decreased from 1,464,004 in 2013 to 1,449,824 in 2014, indicating a 1.0 percent decrease. This was as a result of a 0.8 percent decrease in the international passengers from 1,438,546 to 1,427,035 and a 10.5 percent decrease in the number of domestic passengers from 25,458 to 22,789 as shown in Table 3.6.4.

3.7 Communication Statistics

This section presents statistics on some of the key aspects of communication. These include: Telephone usage, Internet market and Mobile Money statistics.

3.7.1 Telephone Usage

The telecommunications sub-sector posted an increase in the number of subscribers in the year 2014. In the context of telecommunications, any registered active line/SIM (active means the line has registered a transaction or more within the last 90 days) is considered a subscriber.

Table 3.7.1 below shows that there was 12.8 percent increase in telephone subscribers from 18.3 million subscribers in 2013 to 20.6 million subscribers in 2014. Subsequently, the national teledensity increased by 8.9 percent from 51.9 lines per 100 people in 2013 to 56.5 lines per 100 people in 2014. The volume of talk time decreased by 11.9 percent from 17,358 million minutes in 2013 to 15,291 million minutes in 2014. This represents a 9.5 percent decrease in the international talk time, a significant 48.4 per cent decrease in off-net talk time and a 5.9 percent decrease in on-net talk time (Statistical Appendix Table 3.7A).

3.7.2 Call Tariffs

In a move to standardise rates by mobile telecommunications service providers, the average call rate for both on-net and off-net rose to shs. 274 and shs.309 respectively in 2014. This indicated a 3.4 per cent increment in call rates for on-net calls, 1.9 percent decrease for off-net calls.

3.7.3 Internet market

During 2014, a significant 55.9 percent increase in the total number of internet subscribers was realised and this was due to a 12.4 percent increase in the fixed internet subscribers and a 57.1 percent increase in the mobile internet subscribers. The internet penetration rose from 20.7 percent in 2013 to 29.5 percent in 2014. This was as a result of an increase in accessibility to the internet.

3.7.4 Mobile Money Transactions

The total number of registered customers increased by 30.1 percent from 14.2 million customers in 2013 to 18.5 million customers in 2014. The number of transactions increased by 28.9 percent from 38.3 million in 2013 to 49.4 million in 2014 and the value of the transactions increased by 16.9 percent from 1,982 billion shillings in 2013 to 2,316 billion shillings in 2014.

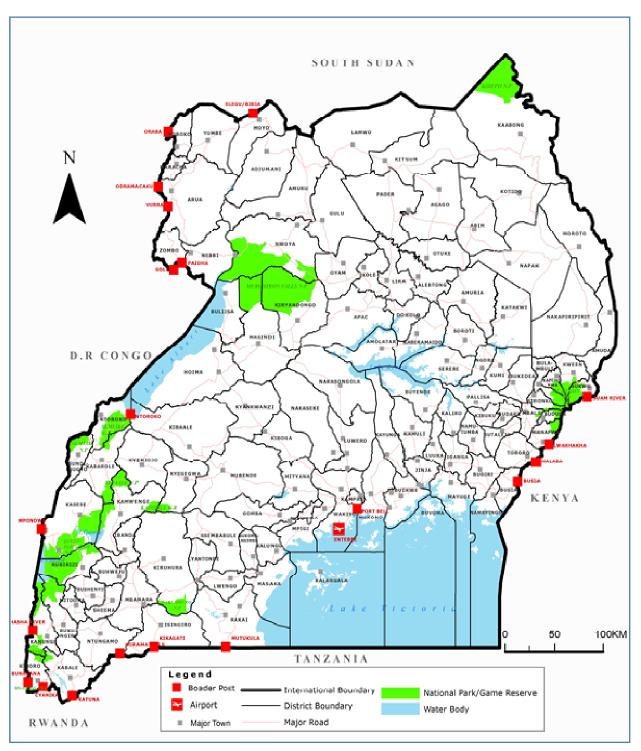
3.7.5 Postal and Courier services

The volume of letters handled by Posta Uganda decreased by 12.4 percent from 2.2 million in 2013 to 1.9 million in 2014. Parcels received from abroad decreased by 12.6 percent from 18.863 in 2013 to 16,478 in 2014. The Expedited Mail Service (EMS) items posted decreased from 211,454 to 163,317 by 22.8 percent while those received decreased by 24.4 percent from 10,714 in 2013 to 8,100 in 2014. (Statistical Appendix Table 3.7 C).

3.8 Migration and Tourism Statistics

This section presents a summary of International movement of persons through gazetted points of entry and exit and also covers Tourism Statistics (hotel occupancy levels for some hotels and other related accommodation establishments as well as visitors to national parks in the country). The information presented here is based on the Arrival/Departure declaration cards filled at the 22 gazetted border points. Information on the arrivals and departures is collected using cards of the Ministry of Internal Affairs (MOIA)

3.8.1 International Arrivals and Departures Statistics

The country recorded a total of 1.7 million arrivals and about 1.6 million departures of persons in 2014. The number of arrivals and departures has grown consistently since 2010. There was a sharp increase in number of arrivals between 2010 and 2011. The arrivals through official border posts increased by 1.0 percent between 2013 and 2014, while departures increased by 2.0 percent in the same period as shown in Table 3.8.1. Throughout the period, there were more males than females arriving into and departing from the country.

Figure 3.8.1: International Arrivals by Sex (Percentage),2010 – 2014

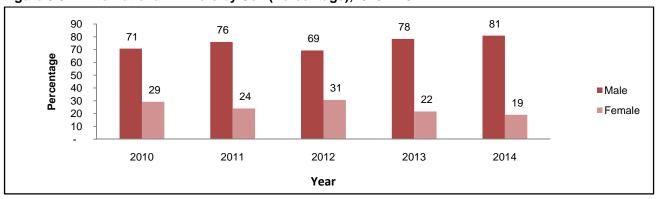
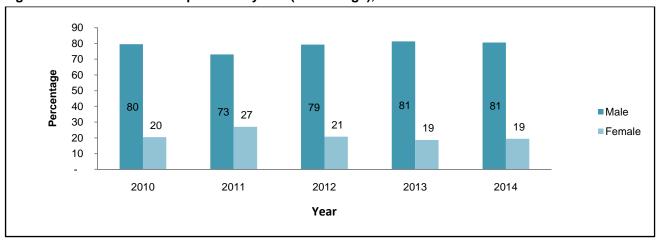


Figure 3.8.2: International Departures by Sex (Percentage), 2010 - 2014



3.8.2 EAC Arrivals and Departures Statistics (Region Partner States)

The East African Community (EAC) Common Market Protocol guarantees free movement of persons who are citizens of Partner States within the EAC territory.(Article7: of the Protocol on the Establishment of the EAC Common Market). Arrival and departure statistics is therefore important in monitoring of the EAC Common Market Protocol. The number of arrivals from EAC member states increased from 550,000 in 2010 to about 807,000 in 2014. Over the past five years, the majority of arrivals and departures were from Kenya followed by Rwanda, accounting for 88 percent of the arrivals and 89 percent of the departures. The net movement between Uganda and other partner states within the region reduced from 80,000 persons in 2012 to 30,000 in 2014.

3.8.3 Tourist Arrivals

A Tourist is any person travelling to and staying in a place outside their usual residence (environment) for a period of not more than twelve consecutive months for leisure, business and other purposes not related to the exercise of an activity remunerated from within the place visited. Table 3.8.3 shows that out of 1.7 million total arrivals in 2014, 1.3 million (74 percent) were tourist arrivals. The number of tourist arrivals has remained almost the same between 2012 and 2014. During the period (2010-2014) the tourist arrivals were consistently higher than the departures, resulting into a positive net movement.

3.8.3.1 Place of Origin of Tourist Arrivals.

In 2014, most tourist arrivals in the country were from the African continent (78 percent) followed by Europe (9 percent) America and Asia (both 6 percent). Tourists from the neighbouring countries including (Kenya, Rwanda, Tanzania, the South Sudan and D.R. Congo) accounted for 69 percent of all tourist arrivals. This was followed by the United States and United Kingdom accounting for 5 percent and 3 percent of tourist arrivals respectively (Statistical Appendix Table 3.8 L).

3.8.3.2 Tourist Arrivals by Mode of Travel

The number of tourist arrivals by air transport increased from 369,000 in 2010 to 443,000 persons in 2014. Majority of Tourist Arrivals arrived by road. Katuna, Busia, Malaba, Cyanika and Elegu\Atiak were the major entry points used. Out of the 22 gazetted entry points, only Entebbe International Airport can be accessed by air. The other points are only accessed by road.

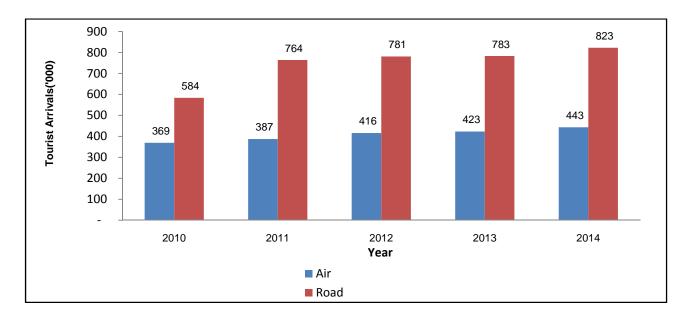


Figure 3.8.2: Tourist Arrivals by Mode of Transport ('000s), 2010–2014

3.8.3.3 Age-Sex Composition of Tourist Arrivals.

Males have consistently dominated the tourist arrivals into Uganda. On average they constituted over 70 percent of the Tourist Arrivals for the past five years (2010 -2014). In 2014, the majority (59 percent) of the tourist arrivals were in the age group 20-39 years followed by the age group 40-59 years (30 percent). On average tourists aged less than 20 years and above accounted for about 5 percent and 4 percent respectively of the total tourist arrivals in period 2010 -2014 as shown in Statistical Appendix Table 3.8 C and 3.8 M.

3.8.3.4 Tourist Arrivals by Purpose of Visit

Table 3.8.4 shows that the majority of Tourists Arrivals came into the country to visit friends and relatives followed by those who came to attend business and professional conferences then those who came for leisure, recreation and holidays. The number of tourists for leisure, recreation and holidays increased from 188,000 in 2013 to 220,000 in 2014 representing a 17 percent increase, where as the tourists visiting friends and relatives declined from 528,000 in 2013 to 441,000 in 2014, indicating a 16 percent decline.

3.8.4 Visitors to National Parks

Uganda has twelve national parks and three active game reserves (See figure 3.1). These offer a wide range of tourism products including gorilla tracking, nature guided walks, village walks, butterfly and bird watching, rare fauna and flora species. Figure 3.6.3 shows that the number of visitors to the national parks showed no consistent pattern between 2010 and 2014. The Number of visitors declined from 214,000 in 2013 to 203,000 in 2014 representing a 5 percent decline.

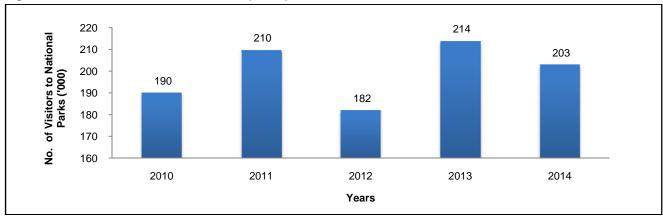


Figure 3.8.3: Visitor to National Parks (000's), 2010-2014

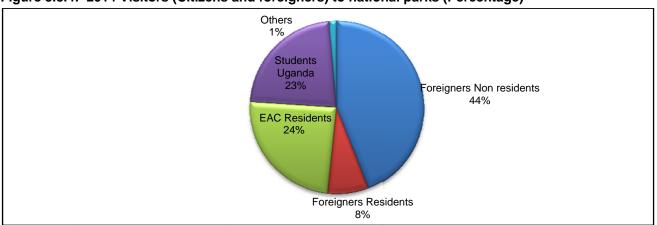


Figure 3.8.4: 2014 Visitors (Citizens and foreigners) to national parks (Percentage)

The most commonly visited national park in 2014 was Murchison Falls (33 percent) followed by Queen Elizabeth (29 percent) and Lake Mburo National Park (13 percent). These three collectively account for three in four of the visitors to National Parks. There was a 5 percent decline in the number of visitors to the national parks between 2013 and 2014. (Statistical Appendix Table 3.8 N). Figure 3.8.4 shows the annual number of visitors to the national parks in 2014 by category. The highest percentage (44 percent) of visitors to national parks were non residents of foreign origin followed by residents from East African countries and Ugandan students accounting for 24 percent and 23 percent respectively.

CHAPTER FOUR

4 MACRO ECONOMIC STATISTICS

4.1 National Accounts

4.1.1 Gross Domestic Product

In November 2014, UBOS released rebased GDP series with the new base year 2009/10. All GDP figures previously shared have thus been revised.

The Revised Annual Gross Domestic Product (AGDP) estimates (Rebase GDP series) for the fiscal year (FY) 2014/15 indicate a better performance of the economy compared to 2013/14. The economy registered a 0.2 percentage point better performance than in 2013/14. Specifically, the real GDP at market prices is estimated to have grown by 5.0 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to a revised growth of 4.8 percent registered for FY 2013/14. Real GDP at basic prices is estimated to grow at 5.2 percent in 2014/15 compared to a revised growth of 3.9 percent that was registered in 2013/14 (See Table 4.1.1).

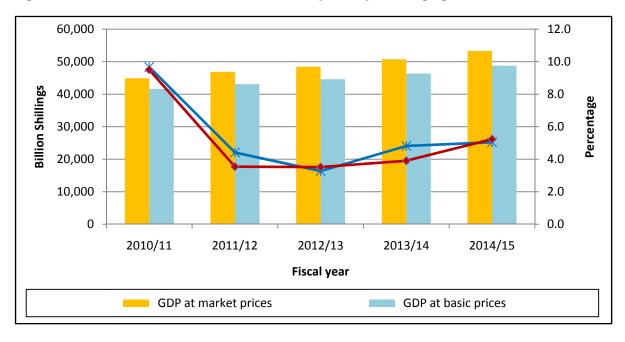

4.1.2 Performance of Production Sectors

4.1.2.1 Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing Sector

The valued added growth of Cash crops, Food crops, Livestock, Forestry and Fishing agricultural activities remainedat3.0 percent for the FY 2014/15. The major contributors to the overall growth in the sector were food crops growing activities and livestock. The food crops activities grewby 4.1 percent in 2014/15 compared to a revised growth of 3.1 percent in 2013/14. A decline of 2.6 percent was registered in cash crop growing activities. (Statistical appendix Table 4.2C(ii) and Statistical Appendix 4.2D(i)). The share of agriculture (crop and livestock), forestry, agriculture support services, and fishing activities to total GDP at current prices is estimated at 22.6 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to 23.1 percent in FY 2013/14.

4.1.2.1.1 Cash crops

The cash crops growing activities include coffee, cotton, tea, cocoa, tobacco, sugar cane and horticultural products. Overall cash crop growing activities are estimated to have declined by 2.6 percent in FY 2014/15 as compared to a growth of 4.0 percent during FY 2013/14. Growth in cash crops growing activities was registered in: sugarcane (28.6 percent), cotton (18.4 percent), Palm (12.3 percent), and tea (8.9 percent). During the same year, there was a decline in some cash crop activities and these included:Tobacco (-76.7 percent), Vanilla (-37.8 percent), cocoa (-12.4 percent), Coffee (-5.4 percent) and flowers & horticulture (-3.6 percent). Cash crops contributed 1.7 percent to total GDP at current prices in FY 2014/15 compared to 1.6 percent in FY 2013/14.

4.1.2.1.2 Food crops

Food crops growing activities are estimated to have grown by 4.1 percent in the FY 2014/15 compared to a growth of 3.1 percent in FY 2013/14. Food crops growing activities that registered growth in 2014/15 included: Bananas, Sesame (sim-sim), Sunflower, Wheat, Rice and Soya beans. Contractions were recorded in the food crop growing activities of: cassava, cow-peas and ground nuts. Food crops contributed 11.5 percent to total GDP at current prices in FY 2014/15 compared to 12.7 percent in FY 2013/14.

4.1.2.1.3 Fishing

Fishing activities grew by 1.4 percent in FY 2014/15 following a decline of 3.6 percent in FY 2013/14. The activity contributed to 1.8 percent oftotal GDP at current prices in FY 2014/15 compared to 1.7 percent in FY 2013/14.

4.1.2.2 Industry Sector

The industry sector grew by 7.9 percent in the FY 2014/15 compared to a growth of 3.9 percent during the FY 2013/14. The better performance in industry was due to improved growth in mining andquarrying and manufacturing that registered a higher growth of 19.4 percent and 11.0 percent in 2014/15 compared to a growth of 5.7 percent and 2.2 percent in 2013/14 respectively. Growth in construction slowed down to 2.7 percent in 2014/15 compared to a 5.3 percent growth in 2013/14 as a result of a decline of 8.9 percent in the public construction component. The growth in construction was driven by the households and corporate construction activities. The industrial sector's contribution to the total GDP at current prices remained stable at 20.4 percent in FY 2014/15. (Statistical appendix Table 4.2M(ii) and Statistical Appendix 4.2N(i)).

4.1.2.2.1 Mining and quarrying

Mining and quarrying activities grew by 19.4 percent in 2014/15 following a growth of 5.7 percent in 2013/14. After the rebasing of the GDP, mining and quarrying activities have been contributing close to 1.0 percent of the GDP as compared to 0.3 percent before the rebasing exercise. In 2014/15 this subsectors' contribution to total GDP at current prices was estimated at 0.7 percent compared to 0.8 percent in FY 2013/14.

4.1.2.2.2 Manufacturing

Manufacturing subsector (both formal and informal) grew by11.0 percent in the FY 2014/15 compared to a 2.2 percent growth in the FY 2013/14. The growth in manufacturing is attributed to a good performance in the production of beverages and tobacco and chemicals, as well as other manufacturing not elsewhere classified. The share of manufacturing sub-sector to the total current GDP in 2014/15 wasestimated at 9.6 percent compared to a share of 9.3 percent in 2013/14. Informal manufacturing increased by 16.2 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to a 0.6 percent decline in FY 2013/14.

4.1.2.2.3 Electricity Supply

Electricity supply activities grew by 5.6 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to a lower growth of 1.9 percent registered in FY 2013/14. This is mainly attributed to increased availability and supply of electricity to the consumers. The contribution of electricity supply activities to total GDP at current prices in FY 2014/15 remained stable at 0.9 percent. Following the conclusion of GDP rebasing exercise the contribution of electricity to total GDP modestly reduced.

4.1.2.2.4 Water Supply

During the FY 2014/15 water supply activities grew by an estimated 6.1 percent which is lower than the 6.3 percent growth in FY 2013/14. In terms of contribution to total GDP at current prices, water supply activities are estimated to have had a share of 1.7 percent in FY 2014/15, the same in FY 2013/14. The new contribution to total GDP is approximately half the rate before rebasing the series.

4.1.2.2.5 Construction

Performance of the construction activities, which include public and private sector construction activities, grew by 2.7 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to the 5.3 percent growth in 2013/14. The slow growth in 2014/15 is due to a contraction in civil works (public construction) activities of 18.9 percent. The resulting growth in FY 2014/15 is mainly due to the growth of construction activities for households and corporations. The construction activities contributed to 7.5 percent of total GDP at current price in FY 2014/15 slightly below the 7.8 percent contribution in FY 2013/14. The contribution of construction to total GDP was revised downwards in the rebased GDP, from double digit to single digit.

4.1.2.3 Services Sector

The services industry grew by an estimated 5.3 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to a growth of 4.3 percent in FY 2013/14. In this sector, administrative and support services registered the highest growth (33.4 percent), followed by finance and insurance activities (19.6 percent). Services' industry contribution to total GDP at current price was 47.6 percent in 2014/15 slightly higher than the 47.0 percent contribution in FY 2013/14. (Statistical appendix Table 4.2M(ii) and Statistical Appendix 4.2N(i)).

4.1.2.3.1 Wholesale and retail trade; repairs

The wholesale and retail trade; repairs activities grew by 2.9 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to a decline of 0.8 percent registered in 2013/14. Wholesale, retail trade and repairs activities contributed 12.2 percent to the total GDP at current prices in FY2014/15 compared to 13.1 percent in 2013/14.

4.1.2.3.2 Transport and storage

Transport and communications activities grew by 9.3 percent in FY 2014/15, compared to a 3.7 percent growth in FY 2013/14. This sector's contribution to total GDP at current prices was 2.8 percent in FY 2014/15, which is slightly lower than in FY 2013/14 at 2.9 percent and almost a half of the pre-rebase figure. In the new national accounts classifications, transport and communications have been split and this partly explains the differences between the new and old series contribution to the GDP.

4.1.2.3.3 Accommodation and food services

The accommodation and food services activities declined by 0.1 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to the high growth of 9.5 percent in FY 2013/14. This weak performance was mainly due to a decrease in non-resident arrivals to Uganda. Accommodation and food services contribution to GDP at current prices stood at 3.1 percent to total GDP in FY 2014/15 the same contribution as in 2013/14.

4.1.2.3.4 Information and communication

Information and communication activities include; publishing activities, motion picture, video and television programme production, sound recording and music publishing activities, programming and broadcasting activities, telecommunications, computer programming, consultancy and related activities. Information and communication activities grew by 0.7 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to a growth of 12.1 percent in FY 2013/14. The slow in growth is due to increase in intermediate consumption and competition amongst the different players in the subsector. The contribution of information and communication activities to total GDP at current prices was 3.6 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to 3.2 percent in FY 2013/14.

4.1.2.3.5 Financial and insurance activities

These activities are comprised of commercial banking (financial intermediation), the Central Bank, insurance, foreign exchange bureaus and other activities auxiliary to financial intermediation. Commercial banking remains the biggest contributor to the financial services even after the 2009/10 GDP rebase. The financial services activities grew by 19.6 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to a contraction of 0.7 percent registered in FY 2013/14. The financial services activities contribution to total GDP at current prices in FY 2014/15 was 2.9 percent slightly higher than the 2.8 percent for FY 2013/14.

4.1.2.3.6 Real estate activities

Real estate activities which include; activities of rentals and owner occupied buildings grew by 6.3 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to a revised 6.1 percent growth registered in FY 2013/14. The contribution of these activities to the total GDP at current prices was 4.4 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to 4.2 percent in FY 2013/14.

4.1.2.3.7 Professional, Scientific and Technical services

Professional, scientific and technical services activities which include; legal activities, accounting, bookkeeping and auditing activities, activities of head offices, architectural and engineering activities, scientific research and development, market research and public opinion polling among others declined by 6.5 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to a revised decline of 1.5 percent registered in FY 2013/14. The contribution of these activities to the total GDP at current prices in 2014/15 was 2.7 percent compared to 2.6 percent in FY 2013/14.

4.1.2.3.8 Administrative and Support Services

Administrative and support services activities which include: rental and leasing, activities of employment placement agencies, travel agency, tour operator, reservation service and related activities, security and investigation, services to buildings and landscape, office administrative services, office support and other business support, collection agencies and credit bureaus registered a strong growth of 33.5 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to a revised decline of 2.4 percent in FY 2013/14. The contribution of these activities to the total GDP at current prices was 1.9 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to 1.6 percent in FY 2013/14.

4.1.2.3.9 Community services

These services include public administration, education and health. In this subsector, public administration activitygrew by 7.8 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to a revised growth of5.9 percent in FY 2013/14. The contribution of public administration activities to total GDP at current prices was 2.7 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to 2.5 percent in FY 2013/14. Education services activities grew by 6.0 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to a revised growth of 5.7 percent in FY 2013/14. This activity contributed to nearly 6.0 percent of the total GDP at current prices in FY 2014/15 as compared to a 5.7 percent growth in FY 2013/14. Similarly, health services and social work activities are grew by 4.3 percent in 2014/15 compared to a revised 6.0 percent growth in 2013/14. The contribution of the health services activities to the total GDP at current prices was estimated at 3.5 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to 3.3 percent in 2013/14.

4.1.2.3.10 Arts, Entertainment and recreation

Arts, Entertainment and recreation activities include: creative, arts and entertainment, Libraries, archives, museums and other cultural activities, gambling and betting, sports and amusement and recreation. Arts, entertainment and recreation activities grew by 0.5 percent in FY 2014/15 GDP estimates compared to a revised growth of 5.5 percent for FY 2013/14. This activity contributed to 0.3 percent of total GDP at current prices in FY 2014/15 the same asin FY 2013/14.

4.1.2.3.11 Other service activities

Other service activities include: activities of membership organizations, repair of computers and personal and household goods, other personal service activities like washing and (dry-) cleaning of textile and fur products, hairdressing and other beauty treatment, funeral and related activities, other personal service activities n.e.c. "other service activities" activities grew by 7.5 percent in FY 2014/15 compared to a revised growth of 7.9 percent in FY 2013/14. This activity's contribution to total GDP at current prices in FY 2014/15 was1.2 percent, the same as for the previous FY.

4.1.2.3.12 FISIM

Financial Intermediation Services Indirectly Measured (FISIM) adjustment is now done implicitly within the activity that generated the FISIM.

4.1.2.3.13 Taxes on products

Taxes on products grew by 3.1 percent in 2014/15 compared to a revised growth of 15.5 percent recorded for 2013/14. Taxes on products contributed 8.3 percent of total GDP at current prices in FY 2014/15 compared to a 7.5 percent to total GDP for 2013/14.

4.1.3 GDP performance by Expenditure

4.1.3.1 Final consumption expenditure

Final consumption expenditure constitutes expenditure by Households, Government and Non Profit Institutions Serving Households (NPISH) on goods or services that are used for the direct satisfaction of individual needs or wants or the collective needs of members of the community. Final consumption expenditure grew by 12.4 percent in 2014/15 compared to a revised 2.4 percent growth recorded in 2013/14.. See Statistical Appendix Table 4.1 S (iii)

Households: Household final consumption expenditure grew by 12.0 percent in 2014/15 compared to a revised growth of 1.6 percent recorded for 2013/14.

General Government: Government final consumption expenditure grew by 17.6 percent in 2014/15 compared to a revised growth of 9.2 percent recorded for 2013/14.

NPISH: NPISH final consumption expenditure is estimated to have grown by 4.5 percent in 2014/15 compared to a revised growth of 3.8 percent recorded for 2013/14.

4.1.3.2 Gross Fixed Capital Formation

Gross Fixed Capital Formation (GFCF) registered a growth on 1.0 percent in 2014/15 compared to a revised growth of 3.3 percent in 2013/14. See Statistical Appendix Table 4.1 S (iii)

Changes in inventories: Changes in inventories grew by 8.1 percent in 2014/15 compared to a growth of 16.8 percent recorded in 2013/14.

4.1.3.3 Exports and Imports of goods and services

Exports declined by 7.5 percent in 2014/15 compared to a near 0.0 percent growth in 2013/14. Imports grew by 15.5 percent in 2014/15 compared to a decline of 6.4 percent in 2013/14. Net exports worsened by 63.3 percent in 2014/15 compared to an increase of 17.5 percent in 2013/14. See Statistical Appendix Table 4.1 S (iii)

4.1.4 Balance of Payment

4.1.4.1 Current account

The current account registered a deficit of 2,311.9 million US dollars in 2014/15 compared to a deficit of 2,129.6 million US dollars in 2013/14. This represents an 8.6 percent further declined in the current account. The deficit was attributed to a decline in inflows from services which declined by 14.5 percent, outflows from primary income which increased by 20.7 percent and an increase in outflows of secondary income which increased by 16.5 percent. (See Statistical appendix Table 4.1 U). Exports grew by 2.1 percent while Imports declined by 1.6 percent representing a 5.8 percent improvement in the Goods account deficit.

4.1.4.2 Service

Service inflows declined by 14.5 percent from 2,354.1 million US dollars in 2013/14 to 2,013.6 million US dollars in 2014/15; while outflows increased by 2.3 percent from 2,671.6 million US dollars in 2013/14 to 2,732.6 million US dollars in 2014/15. See Statistical Appendix Table 4.1 U

4.1.4.3 Income

Primary income account deficit worsened by 12.2 percent from 639.4 million US dollars in 2013/14 to 717.6 million US dollars in 2014/15. This was mainly attributed to an increase in outflows which increased by 14.8 percent from 649.0 million US dollars in 2013/14 to 745.3 million US dollars in 2014/15. Secondary income increased by 16.8 percent from 1,194.5 million US dollars in 2013/14 to 1,395.6 million US dollars in 2014/15. The increase was attributed to an increase in inflows from 1,386.7 million US dollars to 1,619.5 million US dollars; a decline of 16.8 percent. See Statistical Appendix Table 4.1 U

4.1.4.4 Capital account and Financial account

Capital account balance increased from 91.0 million US dollars in 2013/14 to 106.3 million US dollars in 2014/15 representing a 16.7 percent increase in the account. Net-borrowing (balance from financial accounts) improved by 38.3 percent from a deficit of 1,919.8 million US dollars in 2013/14 to a deficit of 1,179.3 million US dollars in 2014/15. Financial account balance did not register any change. See Statistical Appendix Table 4.1 U

Notes:

GDP series are based on 2009/10 benchmark data (new economic structure) and new methods. The use of new methodologies means revisions in the trends may be witnessed in an activity that cannot be explained by the new benchmark but rather by the method used.

4.2 Price Statistics

This section presents the Consumer Price Index (CPI), Producer Price Indeces (PPI).

4.2.1 Consumer Price Index (CPI)

This section presents statistics on Consumer Price Indices (CPIs) for goods and services. The National CPI covers seven urban centres, namely, Kampala, Jinja, Mbale, Masaka, Mbarara, Gulu and Arua. Eight baskets, one for each urban centre, except Kampala whose basket was sub-divided into two, that is, Kampala High Income and Kampala Middle & Low Income. Also presented are the Composite CPI and the average market prices of selected goods from the Basket of Kampala Middle & Low income.

The price indices are computed at two stages. The initial stage involves the computation of elementary indices from the elementary aggregate level prices by the geometric mean approach. The second stage is the computation of higher level indices which are derived as a weighted average of the elementary aggregate indices.

4.2.1.1 Headline Inflation

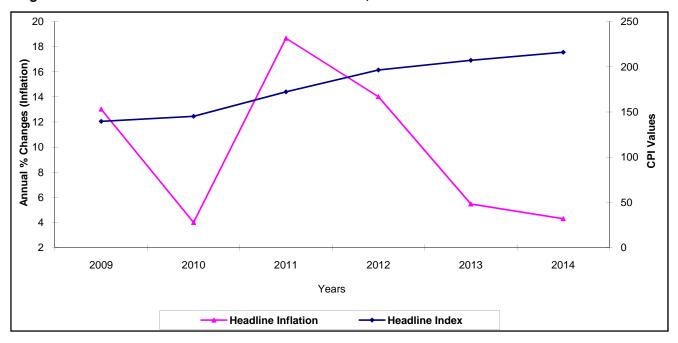
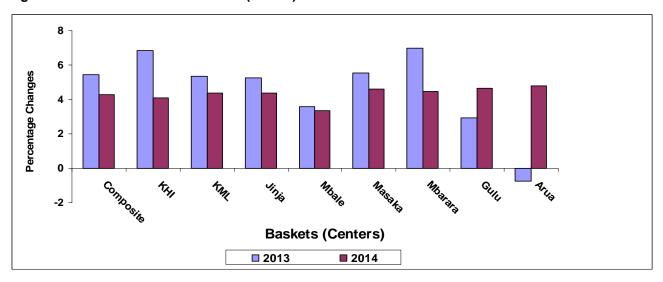


Figure 4.2.1: Headline Index and Annual Inflation Rates, 2009–2014

Headline Inflation is the measure of the relative change in prices of all goods and services in the consumption basket. The 2014 Calendar Year registered a relatively lower average inflation rate of 4.3 percent compared to the 5.5 percent recorded for 2013 Calendar Year, as shown in Figure 4.2.1. The lower rate (4.3 percent) recorded in 2014 was due to small increases in prices of food, beverages, clothing and charges for transport and communication as compared to the same prices recorded in 2013. For the eight CPI baskets.

Arua recorded the average highest inflation rate of 4.8 percent while Mbale registered the lowest average inflation rate of 3.3 percent during the year 2014. The Financial Year 2013/14 registered an inflation rate of 6.7 percent compared to the 5.6 percent inflation rate recorded in the 2012/13 Financial Year. Detailed centre inflation rates are presented in the Statistical Appendix Tables 4.2 A - 4.2 M.

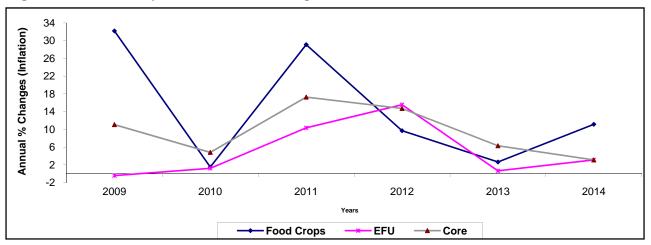
Figure 4.2.2: Headline Inflation Rates (Centre) 2013 and 2014



4.2.1.2 Core Inflation

Core Inflation measures relative changes in the prices of all goods and services in the expenditure basket excluding fresh fruits, fresh vegetables, dried vegetables and fresh milk. Also excluded are tobacco leaves, electricity, petrol, diesel, paraffin, propane gas and metered water. The average Core Annual Inflation Rate declined to 3.1 percent in 2014 from 6.3 percent recorded in 2013 as shown in Figure 4.2.3 below. The decrease in the inflation rate was attributed to decreases in prices of commodities such as sugar, charcoal, clothing, household & personal goods during 2014 compared to the prices of 2013 Calendar Year. The core inflation rate for Financial Year 2013/14 decreased to 5.1 percent from the 6.5 percent recorded in 2012/13 Financial Year (see Statistical Appendix Table 4.2 B).

4.2.1.3 Food Crops Inflation

As shown in Figure 4.2.3 above, the annual Food Crops inflation rate for 2014 increased to 11.1 percent from 2.6 percent recorded for the 2013. The increase in the average food crop inflation rate is attributed to low supplies of food items throughout Calendar Year 2014. The Financial Year 2013/14 registered a relatively higher average food crops inflation rate of 16.4 percent compared to the 0.9 percent recorded for Financial Year 2012/13 (see Statistical Appendix Table 4.2 B).

4.2.1.4 Energy, Fuel and Utilities (EFU) Inflation

In 2014, the local market registered relatively higher prices of electricity tarrifs. As a result, the average EFU Inflation rate increased to 3.1 percent from 0.6 percent recorded for the 2013 Calendar Year (see Statistical Appendix Table 4.2 B).

4.2.1.5 Major Inflation drivers during the 2014 calendar year

Over the 12 months of 2014, the Composite Index declined further to 4.3 percent. Price index increase for the high level aggregates during the same period was as follows: Food (4.6 percent), Beverages & Tobacco (0.6 percent), Clothing & footwear (4.7 percent), Rent, Fuel & Utilities (2.9 percent), Household & Personal Goods (2.2 percent), Transport & communication (4.2 percent), Education (4.9 percent), Health, Entertainment & other Services (6.2 percent) (see Statistical Appendix Table 4.2 D).

4.2.2 Producer Price Index – Manufacturing

The Producer Price Index for Manufacturing (PPI-M) measures the changes in prices of a basket of products as they leave their place of production (factory gate prices). It is a combined index which includes both goods produced for the local and export market, representing 79.0 percent and 21.0 percent respectively. The index is presented in eight broad manufacturing industry groups namely:

- i. Food Processing;
- ii. Drinks and Tobacco;
- iii. Textiles, Clothing and Footwear;
- iv. Paper Products;
- v. Chemicals, Paint, Soap and Foam products;
- vi. Bricks and Cement;
- vii. Metals and Related products; and
- viii. Miscellaneous Products.

4.2.2.1 PPI-M (Combined) Average Annual Percentage Changes

The PPI-M (Combined) which was at 255.8 for the Calendar Year ending December 2013 declined by an annual average of 0.5 percent to reach 254.4 for the year ending December 2014. The decrease in the producer prices was due to a decrease in indices of Food Processing (-1.5 percent), Drinks and Tobacco (-0.9 percent), Chemical, Paint, Soap and Foam Products (-4.6 percent), as shown in Table 4.2.2.1 and Statistical Appendix-Table 4.20 below. However, prices index for Paper products and Printing, Textiles, Clothing & Footwear 4.6 percent registered annual increases to 11.4 percent and 6 percent respectively.

The PPI-M (Combined) registered an annual average decline of 0.5 percent in Financial Year 2013/14 from Financial Year 2012/13. The Annual decline was due to a decrease in the price index of the sub-sectors; Food Processing (-2.3 percent), Metal products (-3.0 percent) and Paper products (-3.9). On the contrary, the following sub-sectors registered annual increments; Drinks and Tobacco (4.9 percent), Paper products and Printing (4.5 percent) and Textiles, Clothing and Footwear (4.0 percent) as shown in Table 4.2.2. and Appendix Table 4.2 P.

4.2.2.2 PPI-M (Local) Average Annual Percentage Changes

The PPI-M (Local) registered an annual average decline of 2.2 percent in year 2014 from year 2013. The Annual decline was due to fall of prices in the sub-sectors; Food Processing (-4.3 percent), Drinks and Tobacco (-0.39 percent), Chemicals, Paint, Soap and Foam Products (-4.9 percent), Bricks and Cement (-0.5 Percent) and Metal Products (-2.3 percent). On the contrast, the following sub-sectors registered annual increments; Textiles, Clothing and Footwear (4.3 percent), Paper products and Printing (10.4 percent) and Miscellaneous (0.2 percent) as shown in Table 4.2.3 and Appendix Table 4.2Q.

The PPI-M (Local) registered an annual average decline of 2.0 percent in financial year 2013/14 from financial year 2012/13. The Annual decline was due to fall of prices in the sub-sectors; Food Processing (-4.7percent), Chemicals, Paint, Soap and Foam Products (-0.1 percent), Bricks and Cement (-3.2 percent) Metal Products (-2.0 percent). On the contrast, the following sub-sectors registered annual increments; Drinks and Tobacco (5.2 percent) and Miscellaneous (1.3 percent) as shown in Table 4.2.4 and Appendix Table 4.2R.

The Annual increment was due to increase of prices index of the sub-sectors; Food Processing (5.4 percent), Textiles, Clothing and Footwear (3.9 percent), Bricks and Cement (1.3 percent). On the contrary, the indices of the following sub-sectors registered annual declines; Drinks and Tobacco (-4.02 percent), Paper Products and Printing (-5.0 percent), Chemicals, Paint, Soap and Foam Products (-0.3 percent) and Metal Products (-13.1 percent) as shown in Table 4.2.5 and Appendix Table 4.2S.

4.2.3 The Producer Price Index – Hotels & Restaurant

The Producer Price Index for Hotels and Restaurants (PPI- H&R) is an output index which measures the changes in the basic prices set by the Hotel and Restaurant service providers for a fixed basket of selected services. The PPI- H&R are divided into two sub-sectors namely; Accommodation and Catering services. The Catering services are further divided into two i.e; Food and snacks and Drinks as shown in Table 4.2.7. The prices considered exclude all taxes and other levies. The base period for this index is the first quarter of 2008 and covers a sample of 100 hotels and restaurants across the country.

4.2.3.1 Annual Average Producer Price changes

The overall average producer price index for Hotels and Restaurants Sector declined by 0.5 percent in the year 2014, compared to a 0.7 percent rise for the year 2013. The producer price index for accommodation subsector declined by 0.1 and catering service sub-sector registered a rise of 9.4 percent as a result of a 10.8 percent rise in Food and Snacks sub sector price index, Table 4.2.7 and Statistical Appendix Table 4.2.7.

4.2.4 Construction Sector Indices

The Construction Sector Index (CSI) is an input price index which measures the cost of a given set (basket) of construction goods and services, relative to their cost in the base period. This basket includes the costs of materials, equipment and labour as inputs to the construction sector. The first quarter (i.e. January-March) of 2006 is the base period for the CSI. CSI is composed of Basic Heading and Composite Indices. Basic Headings are the smallest sets of goods and services which are used to develop Composite Indices. Each Basic Heading covers a reasonably homogeneous set of goods and services, which are maintained over time. For example, items within a Basic Heading are likely to be made from the same material. A list of Basic Headings is given in Statistical Appendix Table 4.2 AA.

4.2.4.1 Annual Changes

Over the period (2010 – 2014), the construction sector overall registered the highest increase in average prices of inputs in 2011 at 25.8 percent, followed by an increase of 8.1 percent in 2010. On the other hand decreases of 2.8 percent in average prices for the whole sector were registered in 2014 as shown in Table 4.2.8. Similarly, civil works had the highest increase in average prices of inputs in 2011 at 25.5 percent, followed by 17.2 percent in 2010 and the lowest increase (0.5 percent) was registered in 2014. The average price of inputs into All Buildings registered the highest increase (25.8 percent) in 2011, followed by 7.6 percent in 2012 and by 1.5 percent in 2013. However in 2014, the average price of inputs into All Buildings registered a 3.5 percent fall.

The inputs generally over the period had slight variations for Inputs into Roads gravel and Roads paved under Civil Works. Inputs into Roads gravel Projects experienced the highest price increase of 30.4 percent in 2011, followed by 22.1 percent in 2010 and the lowest increase was 5.1 per cent in 2012, while Inputs into Roads paved experienced the highest price increase of 25.0 percent in 2011, followed by 19.0 percent in 2010 and was 4.9 per cent in 2013. However in 2014, while input prices into Civil works increased by 0.5 percent, prices for inputs for Residential Buildings and Non- Residential declined by 8.5 percent and 0.7 percent respectively.

4.3 External Trade

This section presents a summary of external trade statistics based on actual flow of goods as recorded by the Customs Department of the Uganda Revenue Authority (URA) and augmented by Non-Customs data sources. In particular, the Informal Cross Border Trade Survey (ICBT) statistical information has been included for the respective neighbouring countries for completeness purposes. The section further presents the direction of trade of goods with respect to Uganda and the rest of the world. The trading partners have been classified according to continent, regional blocs and selected countries. The compilation of External Trade statistics is based on the General Trade System and coded according to HS2012 and Standard International Trade Classification, Revision Four (SITC Rev4) commodity nomenclatures.

4.3.1 Trade Balance

The country continued to experience trade deficits throughout the period (2010 – 2014) as shown in Table 4.3.1 with the highest trade deficit of US\$ 3,462.8 million being registered in 2014. Figure 4.3.1 below shows the trend of imports, exports and trade balances from 2010 to 2014. From the figure, the trade deficit worsened in 2014 due to the fact that the country continued to export mainly low value unprocessed agricultural commodities compared to imports of high valued manufactured products. Furthermore, export earnings decreased significantly compared to imports bill which increased considerably in 2014 leading to the highest trade deficit of US\$ 3,462.8 million.

4.3.1.1 Exports

During 2014, total export earnings were estimated at US\$ 2,676.6 million, of which, formal exports were worth US\$ 2,262.0 million, while informal exports were US\$ 414.6 million. The overall export earnings declined by 5.4 percent in 2014 compared to the previous year. The formal exports decreased by 6.1 percent from US\$ 2,407.7 million in 2013 to US\$ 2,262.0 million in 2014. On the other hand, informal exports decreased marginally by 1.6 percent from US\$ 421.3 million to US\$ 414.6 million. There were fluctuations in informal exports with the lowest being recorded in 2011 estimated at US\$ 355.8 million (see table 4.3.1 below). The decline in the total export earnings was partly attributed to a 12.1 percent decrease in the traditional commodity exports (See Statistical Appendix Table 4.3 B).

4.3.1.2 Imports

The total imports bill in 2014 stood at US\$ 6,139.3 million, of which, formal imports accounted for US\$ 6,073.5 million, while informal imports were estimated at US\$ 65.8 million. The total imports expenditure rose by 4.6 percent in 2014 after a decrease of 3.7 percent in 2013. On the other hand, informal imports sharply increased by 22.6 percent from US\$ 53.7 million in 2013 to US\$ 65.8 million in 2014.

4.3.2 Main Traded Commodities

4.3.2.1 Commodity Exports

Basing on the national commodity classification, exports are categorized into Traditional and Non-Traditional Exports. The contribution of formal Traditional Exports (TEs) to the overall formal export earnings decreased from 27.5 percent in 2013 to 25.8 percent in 2014 after rising from 25.1 percent in 2012. This decrease could be attributed to a significant reduction in the Tobacco and Cotton earnings. (See Statistical Appendix table 4.3 B). Overall, Coffee remained the main export earner for the five years under review. Its share to total formal exports increased from 17.7 percent in 2013 to 18.1 percent in 2014.

Tea, Tobacco, and cotton followed in that order with tobacco registering the highest percentage share decline from 5.0 percent in 2013 to 2.9 percent in 2014. Earnings from all traditional exports fluctuated significantly for the period under consideration. For example, cotton earnings decreased from US\$ 31.7 million during 2013 to US\$ 21.9 million in 2014, while coffee earnings decreased from US\$ 425.0 million to US\$ 410.0 million. Meanwhile, tea and tobacco earnings reduced by 1.0 percent and 45.1 percent in 2014 respectively.

The share of the Non-Traditional Exports (NTEs) to total formal export earnings slightly rose from 72.5 percent in 2013 to 74.2 percent in 2014. However, total non-traditional exports earnings decreased in 2014. Among the commodities that attracted considerable earnings in 2014 were petroleum products (US\$ 144.9 million), fish and fish products (US\$ 134.8 million), animal/vegetable fats and oils (US\$ 4.5 million) and cement (US\$ 3.9 million) as in Statistical Appendix Table 4.3 B.

Coffee, tea, cocoa, spices, and manufactures thereof took the highest share of formal exports (24.7 percent), followed by Cereals and cereal preparations (7.1 percent), then Petroleum, petroleum products and related materials (6.6 percent); Fish, crustaceans & molluscs and preparations thereof (6.0 percent); and Iron and steel (5.0 percent) as indicated in Statistical Appendix Table 4.3 C.

4.3.2.2 Commodity Imports

Throughout the period (2010 – 2014), Petroleum and Petroleum products took the highest import bill and its expenditure bill increased from US\$ 1,310 million in 2013 to US\$ 1,414.4 million in 2014. Overall, its share marginally increased from 22.5 percent in 2013 to 23.3 percent of the total import expenditure during 2014. This was followed by Vehicles, Medical and pharmaceutical products, Cereals and cereal preparations, and Fixed vegetable fats and oils, crude, refined or fractionated whose expenditures were worth US\$ 531.9 million (8.8 percent), US\$ 360.6 million (5.9 percent), US\$ 273.9 million (4.5 percent) and US\$ 253.1 million (4.2 percent) in 2014 respectively (See Appendix Table 4.3G).

4.3.3 Direction of Trade

4.3.3.1 Exports

The Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa (COMESA) regional bloc remained the main destination for Uganda's exports throughout the period (2010 – 2014) although its market share has been reducing since 2012. The combined exports earnings (formal and informal) from the region decreased from US\$ 1,344.0million (47.5 percent) in 2013 to US\$ 1,151.2 million (43.0 percent) in 2014 (See Statistical Appendix Table 4.3I and 4.3J).

The other African countries ranked second, registering an increase in the export earnings with the market share rising from 15.6 percent in 2013 to 19.4 percent in 2014. This was followed by European Union (EU) bloc whose market share increased from 15.4 percent in 2013 to 17.8 percent in 2014. In 2014, the export earnings from EU stood at US\$ 477.6 million compared to the value of US\$ 436.1 million recorded in the previous year. In the EU bloc, the main destinations for Uganda's exports in 2014 were Italy (3.7 percent), Belgium (3.4 percent), Netherlands (3.3 percent), and the Federal Republic of Germany (2.8 percent). On the other hand, Switzerland whose share was 2.1 percent was the main destination for the other European continent.

Among the COMESA Partner States that contributed significantly to export earnings were Kenya, D.R.Congo, Rwanda and South Sudan accounting for US\$ 390.3 million, US\$ 321.1 million, US\$ 269.9 million and US\$ 105.1 million in 2014 respectively. During 2014, Sudan registered the highest reduction in its market share after dropping from 18.9 percent in 2010 to 16.4 percent in 2011, 14.5 percent in 2012, 8.5 percent in 2013 and 3.9 percent in 2014. This could be attributed to secession of South Sudan whose share to the total exports tripled from 4.7 percent in 2012 to 14.9 percent in 2014.

4.3.3.2 Imports

During the period under review, the Asian continent was its place as the main source of Uganda's imports. Its market share declined slightly from 55.3 percent in 2013 to 55.0 percent in 2014. This could be partly attributed to a reduction in import expenditure to India and Singapore. For instance, Indian's expenditure share decreased from 26.6 percent in 2013 to 24.3 percent in 2014 (See Statistical Appendix Tables 4.3 E and 4.3 F)

The African continent came second, an import bill estimated at US\$ 1,019.7 million in 2013 and US\$ 1,143.7 million in 2014, representing 17.3 percent and 18.7 percent of the total imports bill in 2013 and 2014 respectively. Of these, the COMESA regional bloc alone accounted for 12.7 percent of the total imports expenditure, of which Kenya recorded the highest share (10.2 percent) in 2014. Among the countries in the rest of Africa, South Africa accounted for the highest share of 4.2 percent of the total imports bill in 2014.

The Middle East ranked third, with a slight increase in the imports expenditure from US\$ 599.6 million (10.2 percent) in 2013 to US\$ 720.9 million in 2014 (11.7 percent). The import bill from the Middle East countries tremendously reduced from US\$ 922.0 million in 2012 to US\$ 599.6 million in 2013 representing a reduction of 35.0 percent.

The EU bloc in the European continent was the main source of imports whose share declined from 11.7 percent in 2013 to 10.3 percent in 2014. This was partly due to a significant decline in the import bill for France from US\$ 124.7 million in 2013 to US\$ 83.6 million in 2014 and Netherlands from US\$ 108.1 million in 2013 to US\$ 58.6 million in 2014.

Overall, the country continued to export low valued products as compared to the high value imported manufactured goods leading to widening trade deficit.

4.4 Government Finance Statistics (GFS)

This section provides information on the fiscal operations of the General Government. Fiscal operations include the revenue and expenditure of government institutional units. Government revenue is further presented by type of revenue while Government expenditure is presented by Economic and Functional Classification according to GFS 2001 manual. The fiscal statistical information is critical in guiding policy and decision makers to analyze the impact of the fiscal operations at the level of a government, institutional sector and other sectors of the economy.

4.4.1 Coverage

Government Finance Statistics (GFS) coverage is currently restricted to the General Government sector which comprises of Central Government and Local Government (Districts, Municipalities and Town councils) including non-profit institutions that are controlled and financed by the government.

4.4.2 Central Government revenue.

During the FY 2013/14, Central Government net revenue collected increased to Shs. 8,870.4 billion from Shs. 8,276.5 billion in the FY 2012/13. This was a 7.2 percent increase in the net revenue. Tax revenue remained the principal revenue source for government accounting for 90.8 percent of total revenue in FY 2013/14, while the non tax revenue accounted for only 9.2 percent. Throughout the period under review, taxes on goods and services (VAT and Excise taxes) remained the main source of government tax revenue with its share to total revenue being at 48.8 percent. Value added tax accounted for 30.3 percent of the total revenue while Excise taxes accounted for 18.5 percent.

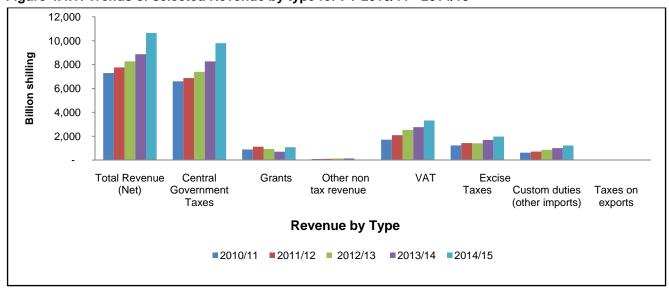


Figure 4.4.1: Trends of selected Revenue by type for FY 2010/11 - 2014/15

Grants, the largest component of non tax revenue was Shs. 702.488 billion accounting for 7.7 percent of total revenue collection in FY 2013/14. This was about 25 percent decline in grants received by government in comparison to FY 2012/13. This is mainly explained by the reduction in the external donor grants to the country. (See Figure 4.4.1 and Appendix Tables 4.4 B (a) & 4.4 B (b)).

From the graph above, the revenue collection has significantly increased since 2010/11 with the largest contributor being the Central Government Tax revenue and the lowest being the other Non-tax revenue (i.e. Property income & income from Sale of goods and services like the administrative fees, fines and penalties etc). VAT and Excise duties have had an upward trend since FY 2010/11. The export taxes mainly taxes on hides and skin has generally remained low over the period under review.

4.4.3 Central Government Expenditure

The overall central government expenditure for the FY 2013/14 stood at Shs. 9,319.1 billion compared to 8,346.5 billion spent in the FY 2012/13. This was an 11.6 percent increase in central government expenditure in the FY 2013/14 compared to the FY 2012/13. Of the total Central government expenditure for the FY 2011/12, the recurrent expenditure accounted for Shs. 4,855.7 billion while development and Donor expenditure were Shs 2,730.6 and Shs 1,732.7 billion respectively. The Public administration sector continued to lead in recurrent expenditure taking 42.3 percent of total recurrent expenditure followed by the defence and; public order and safety sectors accounting for 14.5 and 11.8 percent respectively.

During the FY 2013/14, the roads sub-sector under the other economic affairs sector, took the largest share of the central government development expenditure accounting for 48.2 percent of total development expenditure while the lowest development expenditure was in the health sector accounting for only 1.5 percent of development expenditure. (See Statistical Appendix Tables 4.4 D (b)).

Donor funded development expenditure for FY 2013/14 declined by 17.1 percent compared to FY 2012/13. The grants received and spent by government amounted to 702.5 billion in the FY 2013/14, which was about 25 percent decline in grants received compared to the FY 2012/13. The rest of the donor expenditure were loans acquired. The highest percentage of donor funding was spent on community development accounting for 25 percent for total donor expenditure followed by road maintenance and construction accounting for 20.3 percent of total donor expenditure. (See Statistical Appendix Table 4.4 B(a) and 4.4 G (a & b)).

4.4.4 Local Government revenue and recurrent expenditure

During the fiscal year 2013/14 total Local government revenue amounted to Shs. 2,562.8 billion of which Shs. 242.9 billions was revenue for Municipalities and Shs. 2,319.9 billions was revenue received by districts. Grants from central government and other donors remained the largest composition of local government revenue accounting for 96.5 percent of their total revenue. Taxes accounted for only 1.1 percent while the other non tax revenue accounted for 2.4 percent. (See Statistical Appendix Tables 4.4K (a & b)).

During FY 2013/14, Local government recurrent expenditure (expenses) rose to 1,912.1 billion compared to 1,756.1 billion in the FY 2012/13 which was an 8.8 percent increase in local government expenditure in the FY 2013/14 compared to the FY 2012/13. The Education sector took the largest share of Local government expenditure accounting for 49.3 percent followed by public administration and health sectors accounting for 17.2 percent and 14.7 percent respectively. Recurrent expenditure for the districts was 1,744.6 billion in the FY 2013/14 compared to 1,596 spent in the FY 2013/14. This was a 9.3 percent increase in the district recurrent expenditure. Municipality recurrent expenditure increased from 167.5 billion in FY 2013/14 to 160.1 billion in FY 2012/13. (See Appendix Tables 4.4 O (a & b)).

4.5 Banking and Currency

This section provides statistics on Banking and Currency covering the period 2010 to 2014.

4.5.1 Depository Corporation Statistics

Net Foreign Assets increased by 5.0 percent from 8,426.8 billion shillings in June 2013 to 8,851.1 billion shillings in June 2014. Net Domestic Assets which comprises of Claims on the Central Government, Claims on Other Sectors and Net of Other Items registered a growth of 45.3 percent from 3,641.2 billion shillings in June 2013 to 5,290.9 billion shillings in June 2014. There was an improvement in Claims on the Central Government from a deficit of 104.6 billion shillings in June 2013 to a surplus of 538.5 billion shillings in June 2014. Likewise, claims on other sectors increased by 13.7 percent from 8,098.5 billion shillings in June 2013 to 9,208.2 billion shillings in June 2014.

Narrow Money (M1) which comprises of currency outside Depository Corporations' and Transferable deposits increased by 15.4 percent from 5,244.9 billion shillings in June 2013 to 6,053.4 billion shillings in June 2014. Currency outside Depository Corporations increased by 9.1 percent and transferable deposits (Local Currency) increased by 19.8 percent. Money Supply (M2) which includes M1 and other deposits (local currency) increased by 14.1 percent from 8,932.3 billion shillings in June 2013 to 10,195.2 billion shillings in June 2014. Broad Money Supply (M3) which includes M2 and foreign currency deposits increased by 17.4 percent from 12,047.3 billion shillings in June 2013 to 14,142.0 billion Shillings in June 2014. (See Statistical Appendix Table 4.5 A)

4.5.2 Commercial Bank Assets and Liabilities

Commercial Bank total Assets (local currency) increased by 18.8 percent from 15,692.1 billion shillings in June 2013 to 18,639.8 billion shillings in June 2014. Similarly, the commercial banks balance with the Central Bank increased by 34.0 percent from 1,689.5 billion shillings in June 2013 to 2,263.5 billion shillings in June 2014. The Notes and Coins increased by 13.4 percent from 519.4 billion shillings in June 2013 to 589.1 billion shillings in June 2014. Central Government Securities which comprise of treasury bills and treasury bonds increased from 3,116.2 billion shillings in June 2013 to 4,057.9 billion shillings in June 2014 representing 29.6 percent growth. There was an increase in deposits by 7.4 percent from 1,421.7 billion shillings in June 2013 to 1,527.6 billion shillings in June 2014. Gross loans, Administered advances, overdrafts and discounts recorded a growth of 14.4 percent from 7,676.4 billion shillings in June 2013 to 8,783.7 billion shillings in June 2014.

Commercial banks total liabilities (local currency) increased by 22.6 percent from 12,951.6 billion shillings in June 2013 to 15,875.8 billion shillings in 2014. Total capital increased by 11.1 percent from 2,740.5 billion shillings in June 2013 to 3,060.1 billion shillings in June 2014. Commercial banks' total deposits which include demand deposits, savings deposits and time deposits increased by 23.6 percent from 10,299.2 billion shillings in June 2013 to 12,733.1 billion shillings in June 2014. (See Statistical Appendix Table 4.5D and 4.5E).

4.5.3 Commercial Banks outstanding loans and advances

The Commercial banks outstanding loans and advances (local currency) to the private sector excluding salary loans increased by 9.4 percent from 4,626.6 billion in June 2013 to 5,062.1 billion shillings in June 2014. Of the 5,062.1 billion shillings given out in loans in June 2014, the biggest percentage (28.5 percent) went to Personal loans and household loans; Building, mortgage and construction with 21.4 percent and Trade with 20.1 percent. Loans to the agricultural sector (in local currency) increased by 32.4 percent from 295.0 billion shillings in June 2013 to 390.6 billion shillings in June 2014. Of the 390.6 billion shillings given out in June 2014, 61.3 percent went into agriculture processing and marketing (Crop Finance). There was a decline of 21.5 percent in loans to mining and quarrying, from 14.1 billion shillings in June 2013 to 11.1 billion shillings in June 2014. Loans to trade increased by 7.3 percent from 949.5 billion shillings in June 2013 to 1,018.8 billion shillings in June 2014.

Foreign currency loans and advances (in local currency equivalent) to the private sector excluding salary loans increased by 22.0 percent from 3,049.8 billion shillings in June 2013 to 3,721.6 billion shillings in June 2014. Agriculture loans increased by 54.8 percent from 266.9 billion shillings in June 2013 to 413.3 billion shillings in June 2014. Trade loans (in local currency equivalent) increased 32.0 percent from 609.2 billion shillings in June 2013 to 803.9 billion shillings in June 2014. Building (in local currency equivalent), Mortgage and construction loans and advances (in local currency equivalent) grew by 24.2 percent from 771.9 billion shillings in June 2013 to 958.8 billion shillings in June 2014. (See Statistical Appendix Table 4.5F and 4.5G)

4.5.4 Interest Rates

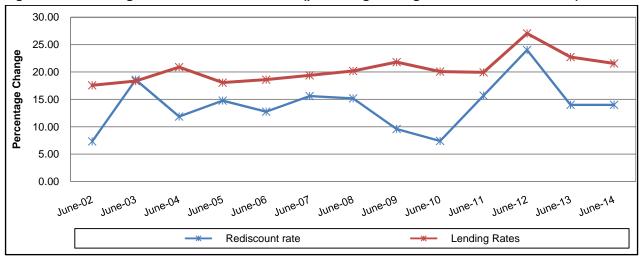
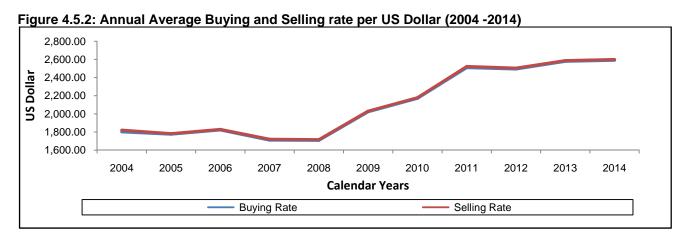


Figure 4.5.1:Lending Rate and Rediscount rate (percentage change June 2002 – June 2014)

The Central Bank Rate (CBR) remained stable at 11.0 percent in June 2014. Treasury Bills (monthly average annualized discount rates) were as follows; 91 days 8.9 percent, 182 days 10.4 percent and 364 days 10.6 percent as at June 2014. Commercial banks weighted average deposit rates was 2.43 percent while the weighted average lending rate for local currency loans was at 21.4 percent as at June 2014 (See Figure 4.5.1 below and Statistical Appendix Table 4.5 B).

4.5.5 Exchange Rates

The average exchange rate for Uganda Shilling per US dollar depreciated further by 0.5 percent in 2014. The buying rate increased from shillings 2,578 in 2013 to shillings 2,590 in 2014. The selling rate increased from shillings 2,587 in 2013 to shillings 2,599 in 2014. Furthermore, the Bureau mid rate and interbank rate depreciated by 0.5 percent in 2014 (See Figure 4.5.2 below and Statistical Appendix Table 4.5 C).



4.5.6 Inter-bank Forex Transactions

The overall volume of purchases of foreign exchange across commercial banks and forex bureaus declined by 0.5 percent from 12,306.6 million US dollars in 2013 to 12,240.4 million US dollars in 2014. Similarly, the volume of sales foreign exchange across commercial banks and forex bureaus declined by 1.8 percent from 11,585 million US dollars in 2013 to 11371.4 million US dollars in 2014 (See Statistical Appendix Table 4.5 H).

4.6 Insurance

This section presents statistics on insurance services and includes the number of life and non-life policies issued, premium supplements as well as paid and outstanding claims. Also included are the Non-life business and the consolidated balance sheet of insurance companies. The statistics cover the period 2009 to 2013.

4.6.1 Policies issued

Life policies issued include Individual, Group, Medical and Deposit Administrative Plan (DAP) while non-life insurance policies include fire, marine/aviation, motor and miscellaneous accidents. Medical insurance was separated from miscellaneous accidents which was under non-life policies and thus grouped under life policies in order to track its performance on the market.

4.6.2 Insurance companies' income and expenditure

The number of life policies issued by insurance companies generally increased in 2013 compared to the previous years. Life insurance gross premium incomings increased by 41.1 percent from 39,255 million in 2012 to 55,405 UGX million shillings in 2013. There was growth in gross premium incomings in all the categories that is Life (Individual), Life (Group), DAP, and Medical (See Statistical Appendix Table 4.6 A).

Life insurance for the reinsurance outgoings category grew from 5,548 million shillings in 2012 to 12,172 million in 2013, representing an increase of 119.4 percent. The growth was due to an increase in life group category and the introduction of Medical insurance in 2013 which was at 3,424 million shillings. The life individual category registered a slight increase from 119 Million to 190 Million during the same period (see statistical Appendix Table 4.6 B).

Non-life insurance gross premium incomings registered a decline of 2.2 percent in 2013 and the value of non-life Insurance premium incomings declined from 224,014 million in 2012 to 219,068 million shillings in 2013.

The fire category in the non-life insurance premium incomings recorded a 10 percent increase from 56,934 million in 2012 to 62,603 million shillings in 2013 likewise; the miscellaneous accidents recorded a 43.4 percent decrease from 55,268 million in 2012 to 31,271 million shillings in 2013. The Marine and motor insurance also went up by 12.8 percent from 21,760 million to 24,563 million shillings and 11.8 percent from 90,052 million to 100,658 million shillings respectively. There was growth in all the categories of non-life insurance gross premium incomes (See Appendix Table 4.6D).

The fire category in the non-life reinsurance outgoings recorded a 30.7 percent increase from 42,546 million in 2012 to 49,976 million shillings in 2013. Miscellaneous accidents recorded a 49.9 percent decrease from 28,944 million in 2012 to 14,495 million shillings in 2013; marine and motor insurance also went up by 13 percent from 14,496 million to 16,380 million shillings and 28.1 percent from 8,719 million to 11,166 million shillings respectively. The outgoings in form of reinsurance registered a decline of 2.8 percent in 2013 compared to 2012 (see Statistical Appendix Table 4.6 E).

The proportion of life insurance gross premium paid out in reinsurance went up by 41.1 percent in 2013 compared to 13.5 percent in 2012 while the net premium income rose by 119.4 percent during 2013 compared to 31.7 percent in 2012 (See statistical Appendix Table 4.6 A and Table 4.6 B)

4.6.3 Insurance companies' paid and outstanding claims by class

The insurance companies' paid and outstanding claims category went down by 8.9 percent in 2013 compared to 20.8 percent increase in 2012. The Non-life paid and outstanding claims decreased from 49,854 million in 2012 to 45,396 million shillings in 2013. Marine aviation insurance class business increased from 2,214 million to 2,904 million shillings representing 31 percent increase in 2013 compared to a decline of 25.7 percent registered in 2012.

Fire insurance decreased from 3,845 million shillings in 2012 to 1,270 million shillings in 2013 representing a 67.5 percent decrease in 2013 compared to 5.5 percent growth recorded in 2012 (See Statistical Appendix Appendix Table 4.6 G).

The life paid and outstanding claims registered an increase of 6.5 percent in 2013 compared to a decline of 30.7 percent in 2012. The value of life paid and outstanding claims increased from 11,744 million in 2012 to 12,470 million shillings in 2013. The Life individual paid and outstanding claims category registered a 17.8 percent increase compared to a 74.8 percent growth in 2012; while the Life group category recorded an increase of 19.6 percent in 2013 compared to a decline of 9 percent in 2012 (See Statistical Appendix Appendix Table 4.6 H).
